CHEAP POSTAGE.

The question of reducing the rate of postage on letters in Canada and to the United States to two cents per half ounce as now charged by our neighbors has been urgantly pressed upon the government. The reduction there has not prejudiced the revenue and the charces are that it would not on this side. A proposal to establish a universal two cent or penny poetage rate has been made by an English member of parliament, Mr. Heaton, and in a letter addressed by him to the postmaster general of Great Britain, he proves that at any rate as between Great Britain and America the project is quite feasible. It is a fact not generally known but it is stated in Mr. Heaton's letter that the revenue derived by the British post office for American mail matter is greatly in excess of the expenditure In 1877 there were 116,444 pounds of letters sent from the united kingdom to the United States and 1,031,908 pounds of newspapers and other mail matter. Last year the letters had increased to 337,855 lbs. and the newspapers and other articles to 2,780,625. The total cost for conveying all that mail matter by sea was £90 927, but the cost this year under the new arrangement will be only £80,000. The revenue derived from the same matter will be £197,379, showing a profit of £117,379. 


