

DIocese of Ontario. Reports of Committees Submitted and Adopted.

The Executive Committee of the Diocese met at the synod committee rooms on Thursday morning at ten o'clock. Present: The ven. archdeacon of Ottawa, ven. archdeacon of Kingston, Rev. Canon White, J. W. Parks, R. Lewis, C. P. Barry, G. L. W. Stephens, A. S. Spencer, clerical secretary; J. Louisa, E. P. Crawford, J. J. Bogart, W. B. Carey, S. T. Jones, H. Austin, Dr. Henderson, James Shannon, H. Hartney, Judge Reynolds, R. T. Walker, Judge McDermott, G. W. Rogers, clerical secretary, Rev. S. Stanton, A. W. Cooke, R. S. Ferreri, K. L. Jones, B. Smith and F. Prins were also present.

The meeting was opened with prayer. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The secretary reported that the money received for the Ballance church had been lodged with the Frontenac loan and investment society.

Judge Reynolds reported that Mr. Lo Richeux had left the city, the committee had appointed Mr. J. R. McCann in his place. The judge reported verbally that the audit committee had examined the books and accounts and had found everything correct and the securities in their proper place.

The action of the audit committee was approved. A memorial relative to the passage at Bell's rapids was read, requesting permission to mortgage the passage to pay off a debt due upon it. The necessary permission was given.

On motion of Judge McDonald the Rev. Rural Dean Carey, K. L. Jones, H. B. Smith, the clerical and lay secretaries, with the mover and second were appointed a committee to make the necessary arrangements for a church conference to be held at the next regular meeting of the synod. The secretary reported at his request Sir John Macdonald had donated a set of the government census volumes to the library of the diocese.

On motion of Judge McDonald the thanks of the committee were passed to Sir John for his kindness. Mr. Walker reported that the matter referred to Oxford Mills had been settled satisfactorily.

Rev. Mr. Tibbe presented the report of the finance committee stating a number of accounts which had been paid. Carried.

The archdeacon presented the report of the mission board which briefly defined the operations of the board which can be seen by a reference to the report of the board in another column. The report was adopted.

Rev. Mr. Bogart presented the report of the divinity students' fund committee which was adopted.

Mr. Bogart also presented the report of the widow and orphan fund committee which was adopted.

The Rev. K. L. Jones presented the report of the committee on the division of diocesan funds which was adopted.

DESTROYING ELEMENT. NEW YORK PARTIALLY ENVELOPED IN A CLOUD OF SMOKE.

Further Details of the Paris Theatre Horror. The Congregation in St. Peter's Church of Incendiary Origin—Announced by Placards.

New York, May 27.—The Belt line carriages extending from Tenth avenue between 53 and 54th streets, westward to about the middle of the Long block, took fire about 1:30 o'clock this morning. The fire made a splendid start and soon enveloped a large part of the neighborhood in dense smoke.

The general call for all engines was sounded. The flames leaped across Tenth avenue, 53rd street and 54th street and set many frame buildings and stable on fire. These were all destroyed. The police reserves from all the adjoining precincts were called out. The stables, which were brick, were entirely destroyed.

The rapid spread of the flames was due to the fact that the fire was burning in a strong wind blowing from the south. The inflammable character of the building, divided up as it was into stalls with wooden partitions, and the great amount of hay and straw stored in it contributed to make the spread of the flames almost irresistible. There were very few watchmen or stablemen on duty and the flames were so fierce and spread so rapidly that only 25 out of the 1,300 horses in the stable were got out before the smoke and flames drove the horses to the rear of the building.

The houses on the east side of Tenth avenue were two story frame structures and burned fiercely, the inhabitants being forced to rush from their rooms to the street in their night clothes in order to save their lives. In the rear of the tenements was a large coal yard which caught fire. A sixty story tenement house on 54th street opposite the stables was not seen to be in flames. As far as is known all the tenants escaped with their lives and without serious injury.

The fire was finally got under control at 4 o'clock this morning. The stables and the houses on the east side of Tenth avenue and 54th street were destroyed. The loss will be over \$1,000,000. Elizabeth Walsh aged 76, one of the occupants of the house, No. 540 west 54th street, was killed, and her husband, who was lying in bed, was severely injured. The police rescued her and brought her to the side walk where she expired from fright and the shock.

The Theatre Congregation. PARIS, May 23.—The remains of three men and two women were found in a stable, where the theatre had taken refuge from the flames. It is ascertained that many bodies lie buried in the debris in the upper galleries, where escape was exceedingly difficult.

Paris, May 27.—Among the audience at the opera Comique on Wednesday night, were General Boulanger, General Sausser, General Thibaudin, M. Goblet, M. Berthelot and the Marquis Feronays, prefect of police. They all escaped unhurt. An artist named Philippe, performing a feat of valor in saving life, mounted a ladder three times and saved three dancers after they had been abandoned by the firemen. Eye witnesses confirm the statement that there was no panic until the act was extinguished. The occupants of the boxes and stalls were able to get their overcoats and cloaks before leaving the theatre. The sudden darkness caused confusion, and the staircases were soon choked.
