WORK FOR THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY. Meeting of the Conference to be held in Montreal - Sunday School Periodicals!

At the Methodist conference this morning Rev. J. N. Lake reported the state of the union church relief fund. The net claims amount to \$49,010. Some 466 circuits have contributed \$2,575,59, an average of \$5.50, and when the remainder of the circuits report it is expected that \$9,000 will be the total; \$2,700 will be paid for \$2,700, and the balance of \$5,800 had been borrowed to pay off the mortgage. Mr. Lake recommended the appointment of a conference treasurer, and that subscriptions to the fund be taken up in October.

Rev. R. Whiting was appointed conference treasurer and every station urged to render all possible aid to the fund.

A motion moved by Rev. W. Jackson, seconded by Rev. C. E. Reynolds, regretted the absence of Rev. Dr. Elliott, whose name was mentioned for so many years contributed to the success of undertakings of conference. It terminated thus: "And we desire to assure our afflicted brother of sympathy and our most earnest prayers that he may prove in the evening of life that the joy of the Lord is his strength." The resolution was passed unanimously.

The conference passed a motion appreciating the valuable services of Rev. Hanson as secretary-treasurer of Kingston college and the French institute, and he was continued in active work.

In answer to the question: "What special cases of ministerial standing are not to be considered?" the report was: Rev. D. V. Litch, left without a circuit as he is engaged in temperance work in Australia.

Rev. A. Hardy, left without a circuit for a year, at his own request.

Rev. A. L. Holmes, left without a circuit for a year at his own request.

Rev. L. N. Beaudry resigned his position in the conference. He is going to the United States to engage in the French work there. His resignation was accepted with regret, and many testified to his worth as a minister, and his labors in the United States, as rendered by Mr. Beaudry in the French district.

Rev. J. C. Irvine, of the Methodist church, Ireland, asked to be admitted as a member of the Montreal conference. He was received.

Rev. A. Campbell reported behalf of the evangelistic society that last year was the most prosperous for the evangelist, consequently the society felt encouraged. Conference decided to continue Mr. Winter as evangelist, and placed Mr. Horn under the direction of this society, provided he accepted the evangelistic work.

The resignation of Rev. T. A. Dorion was accepted. He is going to the United States.

Dr. Witherson of Toronto, submitted the report concerning Sunday school periodicals, which showed the increase in the circulation of periodicals for the year ending March 31st to be 16,828. The increase of schools for the conference year was 142, 1,340 teachers and 10,725 scholars. Since March a boon has occurred in periodicals, and to supply the demand the number printed has to be increased by 50,000. The report was accepted.

A letter from the eastern women's missionary society asked that conference recognize that society. Last year it raised \$11,354.19. The request was granted by a resolution which alluded to the excellent work done by this society.

The following were appointed lay representatives to the Montreal conference: W. H. Rosevear, Dr. Lavelle, J. Franklin, A. Brown, J. Jamieson, S. E. Mitchell, A. P. Bradley, W. H. Lamby, Dudley Davis, Rodney Holder.

It was decided to hold the next meeting of the conference at Montreal, on the first Wednesday in June, a week later than usual.

It was moved by Rev. H. F. Bland, seconded by Dr. Antill, that the women's missionary society be recognized as a sister society, and that the conference should send young women as Christian nurses and workers. 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OUT AT CUSHENDALL.

THE BISHOP OF KINGSTON LAYS A CORNER STONE.

Over Four Hundred Dollars Secured in Subscriptions - Handling the Trowel - The Trip on the Cars - Remarks Made to the People.

Yesterday afternoon, in the presence of a large number from the city, the bishop of Kingston laid the corner stone of a new Roman Catholic church, now being built at Cushendall.

At 2:30 o'clock a G. T. train left the foot of Johnston street, to convey those wishing to attend the ceremony from the city.

At the place where the altar will stand was reached eleven cars were well filled. Many residents drove to Cushendall, and as the weather was fine, the trip both by the train and the driving was much enjoyed. A temporary platform had been erected at the entrance to the church, and from this the bishop spoke to those who were assembled.

He invoked a blessing upon his hearers and upon the church. Those who were on the platform, and assisted to the ceremony were Revs. Frath Spratt, Tommy Kelly, McGrath and McCrea. The sanctuary boys were instructed to enter the church, the walls of which are partly constructed, and the clergy followed.

At the place where the altar will stand was reached, when the bishop blessed the altar site and sprinkled holy water upon it.

The ceremony of laying the corner stone was then proceeded with by the bishop, according to the rules of the church. At a signal given by Mr. S. J. Kilpatrick, who has the contract for the mason work, two men slowly raised the stone by means of a winch, until it was a little over a foot from the ground.

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
