THE QUEEN'S JUBILEE

Who Will Entertain the 14th at Montreal. Great Preparations.

Since the 14th Princess of Wales own rifles of Kingston have decided, the railway rates being practicable, to come to Montreal to participate in the jubilee review, the whole question of entertaining volunteers has been discussed by the members of the local force.

The Montreal volunteers in the past have made it a practice to do their very best for such brethren from a distance as came to participate in their demonstrations, and they are determined if possible to excel themselves upon the occasion of the jubilee review.

It is understood that the Prince of Wales refuses to entertain the 14th, and other city regiments will entertain sister corps. The "Vics" will entertain the Queen's own rifles if they decide to come to Montreal.

The "Vics" regiments are not only the city corps of the coming before deciding which to entertain. It is proposed to have a Montreal brigade mess at the Windsor hotel in the evening after the review and to invite all the officers of visiting corps to attend.

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THE WATER WORKS.

CLOSING UP THE EVIDENCE FOR THE WEEK.

What Mr. John McKeivry Had to Say About the Boilers—Important Testimony from Toronto—Adjourning Till the 18th Inst.

At 2:30 yesterday afternoon the arbitration resumed its sitting. Mr. Charles Birch testified that he was a civil engineer and resided in the city. He was employed to examine the excavations in the streets and test the electric light pits.

The result of the examination is 3 feet 8 inches of clay to the pits, and at the intersections of streets, 3 feet 7 inches. In thirty feet, as to depth of water pipes, the average is 7 1/2 inches.
