THE COMMERCIAL UNION CATECHISM Is is not a fact that priculture is the foundation and base of the nation's prosperity, and that without the farmer no

other business can thrive. A-It is. Is not the farmer to a large extent dependent for his success upon having a large number of consumers of his products near at band? He is.

Then the farmer and manufacturer (the latter including all dependent upon him, workmen, clerks, transportation employes etc., are mutually dependent?-Yes.

And the Canadian farmer would be worse off than now were Canadian manufactures destroyed by American capital and skill under commercial union? A .-Most decidedly.

What do the Americans think would be the result of commercial union?

A .- The Washington correspondent of the Buffalo Courier wrote : "Manufactures in Canada have been unnate ally forced by a protective tariff, and cannot exist without government sid. Were the barriers between the two countries removed, the manufacturers of the United States would pour into Canada and paralyze the smaller industries of the country." A Minnesota manufacturer said: "Our two cities, Minneapolis and St. Paul, must seize and occupy the vest region to the north of our border, now, or it will soon be too late. Manitoba belongs to us, so far as its commerce is concerned. An exhorbitant tariff, averaging more than 35 per cent., bars out articles manufactured at St. Paul and Minneapolis. The Manitobana are now using inferor implements and machine. made in Toronto, Hamilton and Chatham, because they cannot affor I to pay the Importation tax on our American manufac-

Are the Canadian implements referred to it 'et or? No; and they are cheaper than the American article. At the same time, the Canadian farmer gets the benefit of a good part of the wages paid to the Canadian mechanic who makes the

Canadian implement. Do the Americans need our material products? No, excepting perhaps fish and lumber. We can ship our fish direct to fish consuming countries (the CARPETS, CARPETS, CARPETS, AT United States included) without the aid of American middlemen. Formerly the United States took nearly all our butter and cheese, but we have taken that trade into our own hands, ship our daily products direct to Europe on our own sccount, and in the English markets what was formerly called an "American" article is now known for what it is, " Canadian," and better prices are paid therefor than for the product of the United States. The Americans do not buy from us to any extent, except fish and lumber for home consumption.
