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THE WATER WORKS

MR. WALKER'S ARGUMENT FOR THE COMPANY. Some Facts Which He Recommended the Arbitrators to Consider—Quoting the Statute in the Matter.

After all the evidence was taken in the water works arbitration, Mr. Walker summed up in behalf of the company substantially as follows:

The statute under which the arbitrators are proceeding is the municipal act of 1883, section 224 to 230. Sections 14 to 20 of the act of 1883 may pass by laws for constructing water works and for levying rates.

Section 4 provides a basis on which the valuation is to be made. It reads as follows: "The arbitrators in determining the amount to be paid for such works and property shall first determine the actual value thereof, having regard to what the works would cost if such works should be constructed or such property then bought, making due allowance for depreciation, wear and tear, and making all other proper allowances, and shall increase the amount so ascertained by ten per cent. thereon, which increased sum the said arbitrators shall award as the amount to be paid by the corporation to the said company, with interest, from the date of their award."

Now, in looking carefully at the act under which they were proceeding, it is found that its wording is peculiar. In the first place, the council is to fix a price to offer. In the next place, the arbitration is to determine the price. This word "price" was, it must be presumed, used in the ordinary sense of the word, and the mode of computing the price. The legislature evidently considered that it would be unjust to limit the arbitrators in their estimate of the proper amount to be given, or in their mode of making the valuation.

There are two important points to be kept in mind in determining the principle on which the valuation of the water works should be made. In the first place, the valuation should be made on the assumption that the property is to be transferred for the purpose of a water works to be constructed. In the second place, it is a principle always followed that vested rights should not be interfered with without full compensation being given.

With regard to the second point it was clearly intended by the legislature to give the arbitrators power to award full compensation to the company for the loss of their property of every kind, whether it is their tangible property or the advantage of their charter.

The question of duration of the charter will no doubt be brought forward in connection with two things. First—Its effect on the value of the pipes and other works. It is to be noted that the company's claim for compensation is for the loss of its business. For the reason he already gave it is contended that the argument as to the duration of charter cannot be used to cheapen the company's property, but assuming that it can, what is or would be the actual position of matters when the charter expires? The arbitrators must of course take a reasonable and business view of the matter. The company would have a right to apply for a renewal of their charter from the legislature, but assuming that such renewal was not given valuable property would, in a large measure, be destroyed and rendered useless, and such renewal would, as a matter of course, be given to them subject to fair limitations as to rates and the right of taxation.

The stockholders of a company would at the expiration of the present charter form a joint stock company under the act relating to joint stock companies for supplying water and carry on their business for another 50 years obtaining the sanction of the city corporation, which must be assumed, would be granted on just terms. No one could venture to assert that the legislature would at the instance of the city corporation refuse to grant a charter and prevent renewal of the charter merely to enable the city to acquire the company's property at less than its value, or that the city corporation would for a similar object refuse to pass a law sanctioning the formation of a new joint stock company on just terms. In fact, therefore it may be regarded that the present company is perpetually in existence with this charter, and that it will be observed that the duration of any joint stock company under the general water works act is fifty years. The same measure and principle of compensation is laid down by act of 1869, and the company is in its first year of its life. The duration of the charter
