Government has not been made known.

Stamp vendors, when they desire to purchase namps, first go to the Bank of Montreal, where

they receive a certificate for the amount they

pay in. Upon the presentation of this certifi-

cate at the Post Office they receive its equivalent and the discount added in stamps. The daily average amount paid in fer stamps is from \$800 to \$900. When the vendors learned of the Government's action they took advant age of the one day's grace allowed them and made purchases amounting to \$8500.
