## TICKS FROM THE WIRES

CAPTURED AND TRANSLATED FOR NEWS READERS.

Pithy Paragraphs Containing Points of Particular Interest - A Column For Private Personal.

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It is rumored that a bloody fight took place last night near Little river, south of Fort Worth, Texas, on the Missouri Pacific railroad, between robbers and train guards.

A terrific tornado and hailstorm has passed over the northern portion of Hughes and the southern portion of Sally counties, Dakota. Crops and houses were laid low.

The national water way convention will be held at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., on July 20. Congress will be memorialized to grant larger appropriations for the improvements of St. Mary's river and other national works.

The intestines of John Witter, of Denver, Colo., who died recently from an alleged cancer, have been examined and found to contain arsenic in large quantities. His wife is suspected.

Sir John Gaor, conservative member for Chatham, speaking at Walsall, to-day expressed regret that Lord Harrington had declined the premiership for which Lord Salisbury had designated him.

The rifle meeting at Frankfort-the-Main has been a great success. The results have shown that the old superiority of Swiss marksmen is gone, the bulk of the prize winners being Southern Germans.

The financial condition of Sangamon county, Ill., has been discovered to be very bad. The county has been robbed of thousands of dollars by the present sheriff and his five predecessors, who will be sued for the recovery of the money.

Two reports in connection with the recent fire at the Quebec citadel have reached the minister of militia. These investigations lead to the belief that the fire was of accidental origin and exonerate the cavalry man who was arrested on the charge of negligence.

Forty miles of the Red River Valley railroad have been graded, and the sub-contractors were expected to commence work this morning. The city of Winnipeg has agreed to issue debentures to the extent of \$1,000,000 of military dollars, or more if necessary, for the purchase of bonds of the road.

A despatch received from Ottawa this afternoon, says that upwards of two thousand district Orangemen, including contingents from Kingston, Smith's Falls, Brockville and Carleton Place arrived this morning. They were to take part in a procession this afternoon, followed by a public meeting in Cartier square.

Boston, July 12.—Mr. E. Perry called from London: "There was a bit of a sensation at Hyde Park on Saturday evening. At seven o'clock a carriage containing a party of four, two ladies and two gentlemen, was slowly driving between the statues of Achilles and the Marble Arch when the Marquis de Laval, the Duke of Brabant, and a friend from New York, after the affair will lead to a hostile meeting remains to be seen. 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## AFFAIRS AT THE CAPITAL.

NEW POWERS FOR COMMANDERS OF THE PROTECTING CRUISERS.

Mon. Thomas White's Tour Through the Northwest to British Columbia — The Threatened Troubles Among the Miners a Lethbridge Averted.

Ottawa, July 12.—It is said that the Quebec Government will not issue the writ for a new election in Ottawa County until October next.

It is rumored to-night that the writs have been issued for South Renfrew and Charlottetown, but confirmation cannot be got nor the date.

Mr. H. G. Scott, Minister of the Interior, starts west on July 30. He will proceed direct to the Pacific coast, following the same route which he carried out last year. He will first visit New Westminster, where he expects to remain two or three days, then proceeding to Victoria and afterwards to Nanaimo, the capital of Vancouver Island. Mr. Scott will stop at Kamloops and at Lillooet, and return to Victoria via the coast route, returning to Ottawa on Aug. 15.
