THE POLITICAL QUESTION. Mr. Wharton Barker, the well known Philadelphia publicist, whose pet scheme for years has been a North American Zollverein, complains that there has been in Canada an attempt to "confuse this simple question of trade relations with all sorts of political considerations."

But the question of the effect of commercial union upon the political future of Canada is one that Canadians have a right to consider, and it is the discussion of this vital point, which is developed in opposition to the new scheme.

The Toronto Labor Reformer continues to gather them in. First it took the Hamilton Palladium into its fold; now it announces the absorption of the Labor Record.

The attention of esteemed grit contemporaries who have been prophesying a small deficit in Dominion finances for the year ending June 30 is called to the fact that there is a steady increase in the revenue, and that the latest figures show an actual surplus for the year of from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000.

The opponents of the policy of Canada for the Canadians are often heard put to it for arguments. The London Advertiser has taken special exception to the new iron duties, which it wrongfully charges will add \$2,000,000 to the taxation of the country.

THE MONTREAL GARRISON ARTILLERY. The reported action of Lieutenant Colonel Oswald and certain of his officers in having resigned their commissions because the department of militia disallowed some examinations for which proper authority had not been given, is we trust without foundation.

If Lieutenant Colonel Oswald has been wronged he has, like other officers, a military remedy at hand, and a soldier like way in which to demand it. Either Lieutenant Oswald has a right to go through with the examinations or he is in error in performing them. If the latter, then they are invalid, and if the former, Lieutenant Colonel Oswald has a grievance which it is reasonable to suppose can be settled, without disbanding the Montreal Garrison artillery, by a reference to the general officer commanding or an appeal to the field marshal commanding the army.

The commanding officer of the Montreal Garrison artillery is far too important a personage to set so bad an example to the force, and however serious his loss would be, his method of retiring from the militia with the air of a disgraced school boy is far more likely to provoke ridicule than any softer feeling.

The catalogue of the newly organized Toronto conservatory of music has been issued. This is the first institution of the kind in Canada, and there is no doubt reason for sending her sons and daughters to a foreign institution to secure a thorough musical training. The conservatory ought to be a success.

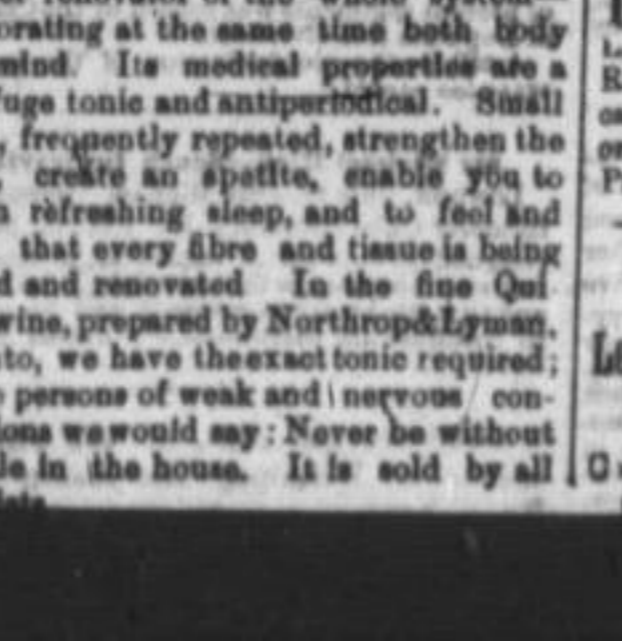
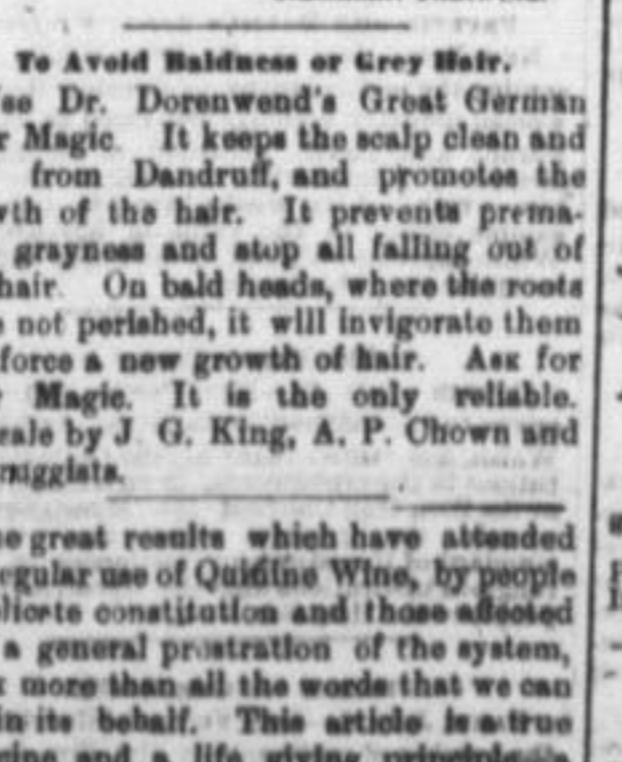
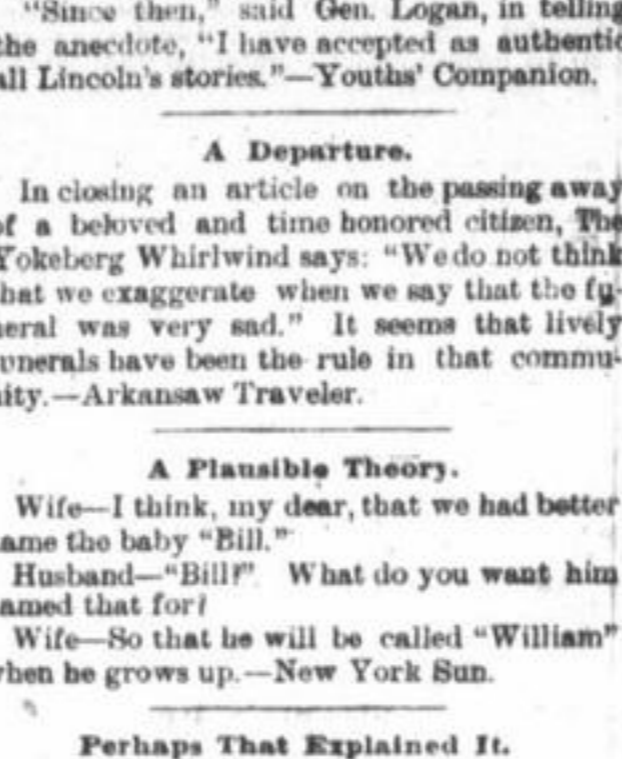
