Fire in a Shipyard. Lewiston, Me., July 15. - Fire broke out about II to day in New England ship building company's yard at Bath. mayor telegraphed for aid to Portland, Lewiston and Brunswick though it looks as if the Bath department could prevent any further spread of the flames. The loss will reach over \$100,000. The fire started in an oakum shop which was instantly ablaze and with acres of hard pine timber chips and other inflamable material around, a great conflagration is imminent. Three hulls of vessels were at once ignited. A schooner, of 1,000 tons, being built for Captain Anderson, of Long Island valued at \$15,000 and an 800 ton schooper in frame, worth \$5,000, and another, worth \$1,000 were destroyed.
