The Virgin and the Book.

Chicago, July 26.—"The Virgin and the Book," a reputed masterpiece of Raphael's, which was seized by the special treasury agents, December 8, 1885, and libeled for duties, was released this morning by Judge Bridgett and ordered returned to its owner, Horace Kiser. Whether the picture is a masterpiece of Raphael or not, an interesting tale hangs to it.

The picture was seized in the Calumet club, where its owner had allowed it to stay until it was negotiate for \$40,000. It was seized in 1890 he kept a small picture shop in Paris, when a print brought him the picture, and so urgent for money was he that he parted with the picture to Kiser for 8,000 francs. Kiser kept the painting and when he came to America brought it with him, and as he became refused to circumstances, was forced to attempt its sale. He has Italian documents, seals and tokens asserting its genuineness, but Chicago critics, who have examined it, are satisfied that it is not original.
