Standing 72 Years.

On Monday workmen will ibegin to pul down the old Methodist chapel building which stands on the corner of Bay and Bagot streets, the owner, Mrs. Hickey, having decided to build a row of brick houses on the site. The chapel we built in the year 1815, and the first pasto was the Rev. Mr. Booth, whose widow died in this city some five years ago. It 1815 there were not many Methodists in Kingston, but they grew and prospered to auch an extent that in 1834 the building was enlarged. Dr. Stinson was pastor at the time. In 1849 the First Methodist church was begun and when it was completed a few years later, the chapel was sold to the late Mr. John Dunn, who, in 1852, converted it into tenements, the work of plastering being done by Mr. Geo. Newlands. When Dr. Burns, a delegate from the Free Church of Scot the Presbyterians here join with the Free church, he spoke several times in the chapel. For many years Mr. Thos. Overend was leader of the choir, and as there was no organ in the church he played the base viol by way of assisting the voices, and he did it well, too. The trustees, among whom were Mesers. Jno. 
