THE DUTY OF THE HOUR.

Those engaged in forwarding the com mercial union sgitation are shrewd. Is their hope to so work upon the people of this country as to incite them to demand that steps shall be taken to effect the commercial annexation of Canada to the United States. In order to accomplish this result, they have taken advantage of the desire for gain existent in human nature and offered Ganadians tempting bait. They are aware that when an opportunity for making money is presented, men are prone to ignore considerations which ought to be taken into account, and that we are all more ready to believe that there is in any enterprise a chance for money-making than to accept proofs that no such chance exists. The commercial unionists are careful to keep constantly before our people the alleged advantages of their scheme, while keeping its disadvantages in the back-ground. The duty of those who believe that commercial union would result in material i jury to our people and finally in the political absorption of Canada by the United States, is therefore plain. We must combat proof with proof. By state ment and re-iteration of facts and figures we must show our farmers that whereas, for a time commercial union might give them better prices for barley, horses, lambs, sheep, wool, and in some seasons potatoes, it would inevitably cause them sertous loss in wheat, oats, corn, cattle, hogs and other articles. It must be made plain to them that manufacturers would be greatly injured, and that the home market for farm products, which is the most profit able market, as they well know, would be for the most part destroyed. Our people must be made aware that commercial union would result in a loss of the revenue on imports from the United States, which amounts to nearly \$7,000,000 per annum, and that the deficit would have to be met, according to the admission of the commercial unionists themselves, by direct taxatlon. It must be demonstrated as it has been demonstrated, again and again, that under commercial union the farmer would lose in his home market, lose be

As the arguments used by the Lincoln commercial unionists were substantially the same as those used by unionists elsewhere, ac cording to the Globe's correspondent the unionists generally do not argue as intel ligent men should do.


