

DISTINGUISHED TRAVELERS.

The Commander of the Atlantic Squadron's Northern Division Returns from S. E.
TORONTO, Sept. 6.
ADMIRAL ST. LAWRENCE, Commander-in-Chief of the
Northern Division of the Royal Canadian Navy, has
arrived at Ogdensburg, N.Y., where he will remain
until Saturday morning, when he will proceed to
Montreal, Quebec.

Three hundred and twenty passengers registered at
the Queen's Hotel at 10:30 yesterday, shortly
after the arrival of the steamboat express from
Owen Sound, and as we will see, they are
those of a rather distinguished party, all but
one of them French. They are on their way
to the Thousand Islands, and will be scattered
across the continent by the Canadian Pacific
Railway, and intend spending a couple of days
in this city, for the purpose of seeing the sights
of Toronto, to which the Admiral and his wife
are entire strangers.

Admiral Vigneau is a very tall, stout, broad-
shouldered gentleman, of about 60, with grey
mutton-chop whiskers. In his face one would
take him mean Englishman, and in his civilian
attire, in which he reached here yesterday, no
one would suppose that he was a French naval
officer.

Lieutenant Dureuil de Villeneuve is
handsome, fair-haired, and mustached, and
with a pair of dark, black eyes.

The Consul-General of France is short
and he wears a light-fitting, abbreviated coat, a
long white waistcoat, and a bow tie, which gives
him looks like an English tourist. Mr. Henri
Jonas is a sharp-featured, black mustached
Frenchman, who is dressed in a style of
looking old gentleman with spectacles and a
white pipe, and Mr. W. C. O'Brien is a young
man.

It was on Aug. 13, and in the private car
of the admiral, that the party left Montreal,
and since then, the admiral has been lying
down for the past few weeks. Two days
were spent in Windsor, and then on through
the great lakes to Sault Ste. Marie, and then
to Victoria, where a half of four days
was made and where they paid visits, received
the warmest welcome, and were given
a grand dinner at the hotel.

Westminster was taken in as a stop while
at the Glacier Mountain. Two days were spent
there, while the ladies were prominent
most interesting, and the big hotel that is
going up something enormous.

The party reached Port Arthur on
Saturday and boarded the steamship Alberta, which reached Owen Sound at 10 o'clock
yesterday. The admiral and his wife, the


