Edward Corrigan Who Calls for a Glass of Beer. Objects to Froth.

Chicago, Sept. 7.-Because Edward Corrigan, a young molder, complained that there was too little solid beer and too much foam in a glass of beer he had ordered in Edward Powers' saloon, No. 581 South Morgan street, Thomas, R. Hassett, the bar tender, who had just revolvers from beneath the counter and p.m., in the Cataraqui O.F. hall, Princess presented them at his dissatisfied customer. He pulled the trigger of one of the wcapons, and a bullet sped into .Corrigan's left brest. Corrigan fell to the floor fatally injured, as was believed. Hassett laid his brace of pistols on the counter, coolly donned his coat and hat, and then moving aside the crowd which ran into the saloon attracted by the shooting, walked away and made his escape. Corrigan was taken to the home of his parents, No. 311 West Sixteenth street, and a physician was summoned, who, after examination, said the man was not in immediate danger. The ball had entered below the left scapula, tearing its way through the muscles about the sockets of the left arm, and passing out through the shoulder, spen its remaining force in tearing away the flesh under his laft eye.

The wounded man is 25 years of age, and is employed in Vandercloot's foundry at Twenty sixth and Halsted streets He is an industrious and peaceable young fellow. Hassett, on the contrary, bears a bad reputation. He is employed as watchmen in the stone yards at Morgan and Fifteenth streets. The police say he is a desperate character, and that Corri gan is the third or fourth victim of his too ready revolver. He shot a locomotive fireman named Brian Kenny, Injur. for one month. ing him seriously, about three years ago The police say he also shot his father when the latter lived on Newberry avenue, some years ago. Hassett's brother, Patrick, was in trouble a year age for shooting a man named Foley. Hassett is married and has a family. He was only employed temporarily in the saloon where the shooting occurred Shortly after 11 o'clock last night, Corr gan went to the saloon and called for a glass of beer. Hassett put out the glass, and when Corrigan complained of the quantity served, he was shot. The police say there was no other provocation offered, and friends of Corrigan state there was no other reason for the shooting, as Hassett and his victim had had no previous quarrel.
