To Elevate Racing. To guard against the injury which might aused the turf by the excessive growth small race tracks, the Executive Committee of the Coney Island Jockey Club on Monday passed the following rule, which was concurred in by the Brooklyn Jockey Club, and will also probably be endorsed by the American Jockey

1. No horse shall be eligible to be entered which shall have started for a race on any race course situated in King's, Queen's, New York or Richmond County of less than a mile, or or Richmond County of less than a fille, or when the value of the purse or prize to go to the winner shall be less than \$500.

2. The owner, trainer and jockey of such horse shall be respectively disqualified from all privileges of these associations to which he or they would be otherwise entitled, such as making entries, training and stabling horses on the grounds and riding in races thereon.

3. This rule shall not apply in regard to races at agricultural fairs or of recognized hunt clubs.
