We hear much about the good management of European railroads, and in some respects doubtless they deserve commendation But what a wide and just indignation would be felt were a similar accident to occur upon one of our own railroads, attended by similar lack of facilities for preventing a fatal result. And how singularly illustrative it is of the slowness of Englishmen to adapt themselves to a change of circumstances, to find a " guard" seated at the end of a train with out any means of communicating with the engineer is case of accident to any part of the train. When stage enaches were the universal means of travelling in England, a "guard" sat on the rear seat, facing in the direction of travel and commanding a view of the coach and its passengers, and the road. He was provided with a horn, which he blew as a signal to any alower vehicle, the driver of which did not seem disposed in time to give the right of way for the ceach to pase ; or to rouse the slumbering or instructive keeper of this tollgate. So the English railroad directors transferred the guard to the rear car of the train, and took away his horn as useless, but gave him no substitute. It was so pleasant to our transatiantic co sins to have the old institution of "guard" retained, that they never thought of its new calling for communication from rear to front of the train on the much safer principle adopted on American railroads.
