Few persons have any idea of the completeness and rapidity with which shis force can be set in motion Immediately on the discovery of the hones at Waterbor Bridge, information giving a description of the bug and its contents, was sent to every division. In less than three hours, the printed "Informations" of the police were in the hands of the whele of the metropolitan force. The public are genery ally acquainted with the London daily mornling and evening papers, but they are not aware that there is a "journal" printed and d stributed every three hours through every division of the metropolisan police. The Police Gazette which is published on Friday morning, was stopped as it was going to press, in order to insert all that was known respecting the supposed murder, and the discovery of the bones. Three hours after, every policeman on duty in Legadon was engaged in making inquiries at all the cab stands, whether any cabman had set down a fare between it and 12 o'clork at or near Waterloo Bridge. The results of all these inquiries were known early on Saturday morning. Vast and complete, browever, as is the organization of the police force, aided as it is by the electric telegraphs, photography and the printing press, its inquiries are not unfrequently bailled by the precattions taken by criminals to evade capture.
