The history of this conspiracy will never, perhaps be fully known; but it appears that a number of young men-chiefly, it wou seem, of noble families -- having many rope, and there imb bed liberal opinions, formed themselves on their return home, into secret society, for the purpose of subverting the despotism of the Czar. At first they contrived to envelope their meetings in complete co-respondence, their signs, their object, and even their existance, thoroughly escaped the notice of the most vigilant police in the

From the beginning of the reign of the present Czar, who rose into power by usurpation at the expense of his brother Constantine, means of a sanguinary insurrection and masnobility have been aiming at the establishment of a popular constitution. Though decorated with ribbands and the insignia of various orders, they feel themselves to be better than a superior class of slaves, in which light they are regarded by the government .-No wonder, therefore, that the more youthfu among their order should have joined the sewhich was to establish a constitutional ernment, most probably a republican form, but un o thtedly on aristocratic principles, since the prople in Russia are too destitute of education to have any notion of political rights. Every difficulty is thrown in the way of discovering to what extent the conspiracy prevaded the nobility; but to all apprarance there are few families in the empire not in some way or other connected with it. When wes to have broken out, what part of the army had joined it, or what were the means of the conspirators, may be discovered hereafter, when it will also appear by what kind of treachery the first hint of the design was discovery was made, the probability is that the blow was instantaneously struck. would not be safe in Russia to nurse a conspiracy by artificial means; because where the despotism exists, in spite of spies, informers, and traitors, the government to sure to remain in profound ignorance of innumerable things which are made known in other countries by the press. It is a saying in France, that men conspire in the open streets; but in Russia the thing is carried on by the fireside, with closed doors, domestics excluded, and amongst the most sacred symbols of purity and religion. Fathers and sons, brothers, cousins, and persons connected by the ties of marriage, by the principles of justice and humanity inspired, unite to strike a blow at tyranny.

In the present case, the meetings of the conspirators were held by night, after the manner in which the Orleanists, Martinists, and Illuminati met, towards the close of the last century in France and Germany, while men of the society were stationed with drawn i swords at the doors of the houses, and on every landing place on the stairs leading to the place of meeting. Some unfortunate accident may have rev aled the existance of the conspiracy to the government, or a single traitor may have been found, who with the hope of self aggrandisement, sold his companions.' In whatever way the truth came to light, the court obtained information of the conspiracy, and with the vigor and violence for which the great northern despotism has always been, like all others. emarkable, it proceeded to make its seizures. and mock trials.
