



The only doubt that the rigid scientific man could possibly throw over the matter would be by drawing the inference that the men had found the gold in some other place than Canada; had possibly bought it from some Californian or Australian miners, and brought it to Quebec to deceive the public, and in order to inflict irreparable injury on the cause of Science. Such inferences as these might possibly be drawn ; but we think they would most pro bably be drawn only by those who have published theories to maintain. Mowever, it is well that there should be the most complete sifting of the evidence before the public mind is unduly excited. It will be pessible, we believe, before many days are over to throw more light on the subject. -Quebec Chroniele.
