LAWRENCE .-- We copied from the Montreal Witness yesterday its remarks upon the necessity of introducing suitable steam tugs upon the rivers and canals of the St. Lawrence in order to facilitate the transhipment of heavy freights, but the descrip tion of steam tugs alluded to is not that suitable for the towing of heavy barges from Kingston to the lower ports and back. A powerful line of steam tug boats is already established and being subsidized by the Provincial Government, are always available to any person having barges to be towed. Besides the facilities for towing afforded by such boats as the Hercules, William IV., and others of the line of Messrs. very large trade in that line prosecuted here for many years, and which has been almost altogether diverted by the unequal competition of the Grand Trunk Railway, which, for the purpose of monopolizing the whole of the freigh t business of the Province, has been carrying at rates ruinous to river vessels. There can be no question of the injurious tendency of the discontinuance of the river forwarding trade to the interests of Kingston. Quantities of freight are now accumulating in the warehouses here awaiting shipment to Montreal, and the only boats available are the small steamers St. Lawrence and St. Helen, and occasionally the Ottawa from Ogdensburgh.
