They not adjust customs duties, with a view to en hance the price to be paid by the purchase and so enrich the home producer, but they impose exhorbitant rates of duty on articles which are produced in the United States, with intent to exclude the foreign product, and so raise the price in this country.

The Tribune, in an article discussing expediency of return to specie payments, marked that, so long as high prices of imported articles continue, " we are teaching smuggle on every one of our thousands of miles of frontier, educating our people to rascality, and tempting the rascals of other countries to make us their prey."


