That it may not spread in Nova Scotia is to be hoped, but that is hoping against hope; and the only real way to lessen the great destruction of life it will cause in Canada, is to prepare for it, and that can be done if the Civic Authorities are unrelaxing in their endeavors immediately to cleanse from fifth their several cities, towns and villages, and to keep them so cleansed. That this is a very difficult thing to effect we freely admit; but that it can be done effectually, is as true as the fact, that in spile of measures already taken, cities and towns are still filthily dirty. .

We recommend the organization of a body of scavengers, properly provided with Carts, &c., who shall every morning examine each man's premises and remove every vestige of fifth, dirt or subbish. This can only be done at a great expense, but the expense is imperatively necessary, and a special assessment, if the law allows should be imposed to defray it. Better pay in pocket a small sum than for com funerals and other mortuary outlays. Boards of Health, as at present constitu are useless comparatively; they are con posed of too many persons; what is one man's business is no man's business; and thus the duties required of them neglected. Two or at most three person selected from the different Boards should deputed to do the work, and these officer armed with sufficient power, and paid their labor, could and would carry out necessary sanitary regulations, and enfor them. It their rule be a little tyrannical, far better to part with a sportion of men' liberties for a time, than die, or w nearly as bad, witness the untimely death of some beloved relative.
