(From the Globe.) We proceed to say before our readers some further clauses of this Act, which will

HORRIBLE AFFAIR IN MONTANA A PREACHER MURDERS A RANCH PRO-PRIETOR-THE BODY COOKED AND SERVED TO TRAVELLERS

From reliable sources, we learn the following particulars of a tragedy which has recently taken place beyond the range, and which would be worthy of the times of the Borgias. Some time in May last, a manrepresenting himself to be a minister of the Gospel, stopped at an frishman's ranch. situated at Tobacco Plains, on the road from Poud d'Oreille Lake to the Kootenai mices. Here the reverend gentleman remained quite a long lime.
