

## COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

#### THE KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, Jan. 5. -Succeeding election. and holiday times there is an air of dullness in all parts of the city. The business men find time hanging heavily upon their hands, and, beyond taking stock, have had little to do. The fine winter weather and good sleighing augurs well, and it is anticipated that business will look up within the next few days. Hay, wood, and other commodi-ties will be brought to the city and disposed of, though one farmer remarked : "Things are so all fired low that it hardly pays to handle them. The produce we have we can hardly get anything for, but for that which we haven't good prices are offered."

The meat market is very slack. The butchers say that the outlook could not be worse. The country is stocked with beef, and prices have gone down so low that little profit can be made. Beef can be bought at from \$2.50 to \$4.50 per quarter, and mutton and lamb at 4 to 6c per 16. per quarter. In Montreal values are without material change, although drovers are more hopeful than they were some time ago, and expect an advance shortly. Prices ranged from 3c for common to 4c for prime, while a few extra beeves brought 41c per fb. live weight. Sheep brought from 31 to 4c, and lambs 4 to 5c per to live weight, according to quality. There was not much doing in live hogs; prices ranged from 41 to 41c per to live

The hide dealers are still offering 6c,7c and 8c per th. for beef hides, but they say the prices will decline. The country is full of hides, and the purchases just now are quite large. Sheep 1 elts range in price from 90c

There has been a growing feeling for some time that the stock of apples will not last until spring. They are rotting very rapidly, and unless a speedy change comes the prices must advance. Dealers are asking from \$2.50 to \$3 per bbl. Only a few days ago a producer asked \$3 per barrel for the stock he had on hand. Light stocks are quoted at 75c to \$1 per bush.

There is a great scarcity of good butter. It commands 25c per fb. whenever it can be secured. Packed butter sells readily at 19c to 21c per lb. Eggs are even scarcer than butter. Fresh eggs bring from 25c to 27c per doz.; the packed or limed fruit sells at 20c to 21c per doz. Lard is quoted at 10c to 12½c per lb.; tallow, rendered, 4c and 5c per lb. Cheese, retail, 13c to 15c per lb.

There is a good demand for poultry, though for the past two weeks the stock offered on the market has been greater than people could handle. Chickens at 35 cents to 50c per pair; ducks, 50 to 60c per pair; geese, 60c to 80c a piece; turkeys, 60c to \$1.25, or from 8c to 10c per fb. The farmers about here sell the poultry in an undressed condition, thus making it a dangerous experiment for dealers to buy heavily at current rates and ship away. They cannot always recover their expenses. There is no change in the price of hams and other smoked or salted meats. Hams range from 13c to 15c per fb; smoked and breakfast bacons 10c to 15c per lb; salt pork 7c to 10c

Potatoes from 70 to 75c per bag: carrots, parsnips, turnips, beets, from 50c to 60c per bushel; beans \$1.25 per bushel; cabbage 50c per dozen ; celery 50 to 60c per dozen ; cranberries 10c per quart ; Malaga grapes 15c per lb ; California oranges 25c per doz.; Florida oranges 30c to 35c per doz.; lemons 25c per doz. dates 10 to 15c per lb,; figs 15c to 20c per fb.; honey 10c to 15c per fb.

There is quite a demand just now for fish, at from 5c to 10c per lb. Oysters, 40c, 50c, and 60c per quart, are sold quite rapidly. This week Mr. Carnovsky put shrimps on the market at 50c per fb. He reports that

they were rapidly taken. During the holidays the grain market was very quiet, but now the sleighing being good it is expected that things will become lively. There is still large quantities of grain awaiting sale in the country. The demand for barley is not what many would desire. Lower grades are unsaleable, and the higher grades are sold off very slowly. Prices for Nos. 1 and 2 range from 40c to 45c per bushel; rye, 42c per bushel; oats, 25c and 27c per bushel. Last week the wheat market looked cheerful, and the demand for the grain in outside markets was much larger than has been experienced for a long time. City buyers would have been able to pay from 75c to 76c per bushel. This week the market has again flattened out, and the prices offered are from 73c to 75c. Buckwheat sells slowly at 35c per bushel. Richardson & Son shipped by rail to Boston to-day 8,000 bushels of barley. They secured the cheapest rates ever before offered to that place.

# BANKER AND BROKER.

A Close Scramble for Debentures Belween E. S. Cox and Cashier Wilkie. Toronto World, Saturday.

Cashier Wilkie, of the Imperial Bank of Canada, and Broker E. S. Cox, of Toronto street, had a lively scramble yesterday for the purchase of the \$302,968 of 5 per cent. City of Toronto local improvement and gen eral debentures, tenders for which city treasurer Harman has been asking for some weeks. The executive committee opened the tenders, four in number, on Friday afternoon. The race was entirely between Mr. Cox and Mr. Wilkie on behalf of his bank. The debentures are divided into three classes: \$3,863 redeemable in five years, \$196, 932 in ten years, and \$102,173 in twenty years. Mr. Wilkie's tender was \$102.25 for the fives, \$104.25 for the tens, and \$108.50 for the twenties; and Mr. Cox offered \$100 for the fives, \$104.10 for the tens, and \$107 for the twenties. There were two other offers, one \$103.61 en bloc and one of \$102. 25, \$104 and \$106.60. The Imperial's ten der was accepted, which is equal to \$105.66 en bloc, while Mr. Cox's is equal to \$105, a pretty close shave between these two finan-

While this sale is looked upon as a good one for the city, it does not compare with Mr. Cox's big purchase last year of \$634,000 of Toronto 4 per cents. at \$97.02. Ald. Lamb mentioned to the committee that he thought all the city debentures should be 4 per cents., but it was pointed out that the local improvements were fixed at 5 per cent., which was the interest the city charged the ratepayers taxed for these improvements.

When the new city of Kingston consolidated debt bonds are issued Mr. Cox will, we understand by his local manager, be one of the bidders for them, and his competition will be beneficial to the city.]
