#### CONTINENTAL AFFAIRS.

SALISBURY WILL COMPLETE HIS CABINET WITH TORIES.

Stanhope Accepts the War Secretaryship-Lansdowne's Formal Declination-Goschen to Contest Liverpool-Why Lord Churchill Resigned Great Indignation in Ireland.

LONDON, Jan. 6. - Lord Randelph Clurchhill, in a letter to the conservative whips, devoted to explaining the motives of his resignation from the Marquis of Salisbury's cabinet, says it was not prompted in any degree by disloyalty to his party, but was due rather to his appreciation of the necessity of preparing for the next general election. He was discontented, he says, with the present position of the conservatives in holding power by the sufferance of a section of the liberal party. He wanted to remove the popular prejudice against the conservatives which had been fostered by the radical cry that the conservatives are reckless in their devotion to a spread-eagle and provocative policy abroad, and are extravagant and reactionary at home. He expected, he declared, to accomplish this end by adopting a broad policy calculated to win the masses of the people to the conservative ranks. It was because he feared that the policy framed by his colleagues in the ministry would be likely to defeat these essential objects that he was reluctantly compelled to resign.

The St. James Gazette declares that Lord Randolph Churchill was responsible for what it calls the "Anglo-American mail contracts

The Marquis of Lansdowne's declination of office, proffered by the Marquis of Salisbury, has been received by the latter.

It is expected that Lord Salisbury will make no further effort to complete his cabinet with whigs, but will fill the vacant offices with conservatives.

The conservative council of Liverpool has invited Mr. Goschen to contest, the vacant parliamentary seat there, and it is thought that he will consent.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—The Standard says that Mr. Gladstone is prepared to modify his home rule scheme with a view to the conciliation of the dissident liberals. According to the Standard he is willing to confine the powers of the proposed Irish legislative body to questions exclusively Irish which may be delegated to it.

Neither the lady nor the marquis will deny the charge of adultery, which the marchioness makes against her husband. The case will be treid in Edinburgh because the Scotch law grants a wife divorce for adultry alone.
