



NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7. - Brokers were agreed last night that the buying of stocks all through the day yesterday was an improvement on the selling. Many thought that Cammack, who has been acting for Gould, had covered a large line of shorts and had about concluded to let the stocks have something of a substantial rally before putting out any fresh lines. London brokers were inclined to anticipate the effect of our strong closing and bought, heavily of R.G., St. P., Eries, U.P. and Les, for the effect it may have on European exchanges. Last night, at all up-town resorts, the feeling had completely changed, and bulls were found on all sides. The conservatives, however, do not think the rise has come to-day. Their argument is that there is still a large outstanding short interest in a few specialties, and this, if forced to cover, will cause an other flurry, but until such time as congressional matters of importance to the street die out of the way there will be no permanent improvement. The tenacity with which R.T. is held led to the opinion that dickerings between southern interests still goes on.

INVERARY FARMERS' CLUB.

Discussing the Best Kind of Horses for Services Upon the Farm.

The Inverary farmers' club held its regular meeting on . Wednesday evening, Dec. 22nd; the president in the chair. The subject for the evening "care of horses and management generally" was opened by A. Ritchie with an exhaustive account of the management and breeding of horses, with the pedigrees of some most noted stock, ending with a description of the way he took care of his own; feeds roots as well as grain during winter, blankets, furnishes ample bedding and keep them in a warm stable, giving them enough exercise to keep them in a healthy state.

William Furgeson said that horses were the most valuable stock on the farm. Farmers as a rule do not take proper care of their horses leaving them out in the cold, never blanketing or grooming them and seeming to think a horse has no feeling whatever, and treating it accordingly. Young colts especially should be well cared for during the first winter. They should have good warm stable, and be properly groomed and furnished with plenty of bedding. They should be fed according to the amount of work they are doing. Three galdons of oats per day if working hard and

less if not busy all the time. John Quail said that thoroughbred Percherons were a good cross on our common mares and found them the most tractable horses he ever handled. He does not approve of feeding colts up as they were more likely to get injured when running about. He thought the Clydesdale horses too slow for this part of the country, while most of the farmers patronized the first horse that came along so long as he was cheap. Mr. S. Perry did not like the Percheron or Clydesdale, but thought the Cleveland Bay was the most desirable horse for one's own use. He did not believe in extra feeding a colt the first winter. Mr. E. Tellspreferred the Percheron horse. He never saw as good a class of horses through this section as they are. They should have grain all the time, should always be well rubbed down when they come into the stables, and be fed regular. He would not feed colts too much grain but enough to prevent them from getting poor Mr. W. Perry found that colts did not do well without extra feed the first winas need be on the farm. Horses are healthier if allowed to get a little thin during the winter, and appear to do better always. He feeds his horses well and beds them well, but does not make a practice of grooming them. J. Gibson thought a good deal of the coach horse or the Cleveland Bay, but liked the Percheron when nearly pure bred for farm purposes. Mr. J. E. Dowlin said the Parisian horses were the best he knew of. Percherons were good for the farm, but were too slow for the road, He said he gave the horse water before feeding and then, if convenient, not to feed for a short time after and the horse digests his food better. Horses kept in poor stables and badly cared for required more feed to keep them up. He Cleveland Boy, Percheron and Suffolk Punch were all good horses to use on the farm. Colts required extra feed the first winter to keep them up. They should not be allowed to run with the sheep and cattle during the winter as they often did a great deal of harm.
