## POLITICAL INTELLIGENCE.

The Present Aspect of Affairs—Getting Ready for the Fight.

**Mr. Curran**, M. P., Montreal, is said to be after one of the vacant Quebec judge-ships.

**L'Espresso** warns the electors to look out for the political storm. It is about to break on the country.

With two elections over and a third one in sight this is a great winter for the back townships entirely.

**Hon. Mr. Wurtel** has removed from the speaker's quarters in Quebec. All hope of the Tories retaining power is gone.

**Mr. L. Taschereau**, M. P., afraid to face the music again in Beauce, has fished for and got the nomination for Megantic.

**Sir Charles Tupper** will be sworn in as minister of finance, as soon as he arrives in Canada in place of **Mr. McLelan**, whose usefulness is gone.

The **Cardwell Sentinel** has been warned that unless it supports the dominion government more cordially it will get no more government advertisements.

**Hon. Edward Blake** has been presented with the gold-headed cane voted to him, as the most popular statesman, at the recent catholic church bazaar in Guelph.

The **Ottawa Citizen** hints that dissolution is imminent, and the **Montreal Witness** says it is authoritatively announced that it will take place between Feb. 3rd and 10th.

The **Mail** says **Hon. G. W. Kirkpatrick** has been asked to contest Kingston in the conservative interest. It was rumored today that he was to give his answer this afternoon.

A special despatch from Halifax says **Sir John A. Macdonald** advises his party to get ready for immediate action, and says: "In all human probability the general elections will come off on Feb. 9th."

It is stated that **Judge Andrews**, **Sir A. P. Caron's** former law partner, is to replace the late **Judge Ramsay** on the queen's bench; that **Judge Routhier** is to be transferred from Murray Bay to replace **Judge Andrews**; that **James Oliva**, **Montmagny**, will be appointed to succeed **Judge Routhier** at Murray Bay; and that **Hon. Mr. Church** will replace the late **Judge Torrance** at Montreal.

Our forecast, to the effect that **James Minne** is to be the conservative candidate for Kingston, is about right. There was some talk on Saturday of **Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick** securing the nomination, but he is said not to be good enough to give up a certainty for an uncertainty. The conservatives will have a meeting, we are told, on Thursday night. There are several men who want the nomination, but they are afraid of **Mr. Gunn**. Any one of them would risk the chance, however, if the association guaranteed expenses.

## A MYTHOLOGICAL SURPLUS.

Premature Rejoicing Over it—Anticipated Effect Upon the Elections.

**OTTAWA**, Jan. 8.—While the conservative press throughout the country is found boasting of a surplus of \$1,600,000, as the result of the past six months' administration of treasury matters by the finance minister, it is more than probable that when the account of revenue and expenditure for January is published a very different story will be told. If, as announced, the elections are to be held early in February the publication of this statement need not be looked for until the campaign is over. During January, as far as can be learned, the government will have to pay out something over one million dollars in the way of subsidies. They will also have to settle several heavy accounts chargeable to expenditure which have been held in abeyance to keep the expenditure account at a minimum until the elections are over. With this increased expenditure they are sure to have a decreased revenue from all sources during the month, especially from customs, as goods for the Christmas and New Year's trade have been taken out of bond and duty paid and for the next two months there will be little in the way of importation. It is but fair to presume that the revenue and expenditure statement published by government organs will be the last one given to the public before the elections are held. The inventive genius of the minister of finance and his ability in the culinary branch of the finance department, in cooking up these revenue and expenditure accounts, has become exhausted owing to the heavy tax that has been upon it for the past twelve months, and the truth must soon come out. Another reason for holding the elections at once is the fact that some one will have to float a loan very soon to make good the deficit of six million dollars in the treasury on the first of July last. It is rumored that the government have negotiated a temporary loan with either Canadian or American banks.

## Preference for the French.

**BERLIN**, Jan. 10.—The German government has forbidden the Frenchmen belonging to the territorial army to stay in Alsace-Lorraine longer than a few days, some manufacturers in that province, who are in sympathy with France, having evinced a preference for French workmen.

## A Boodler in Trouble.

**LONDON**, Jan. 10.—Advices from India state that **Mahomed Sarwar Khan**, governor of Herat, is detained at Cabul, pending an investigation of the charge of misappropriating the revenues of the province.

## FAMOUS BY A SPEECH.

A JOURNALIST OF WHOM THE PROFESSION IS PROUD.

He Made an Address in New York Which Has Made a Great Sensation—The Tide in his Life Caught at the Fall and Likely to Lead to Fortune—Good Luck to Him.

The **Globe and Mail**, and Canadian papers generally, have paid tribute to a representative of the fourth estate, **Henry W. Grady**, of the **Atlanta Constitution**, whose speech before the New England society, in New York, has made him famous. Such indeed has been the effect produced by it that the desire of all classes, including journalists, is to know as much as possible about him.

**Mr. Grady** is about thirty-five years of age. He was born at Athens, Georgia, and educated at the university of his state, which is located in the place of his nativity. While in college he was both a good student and an athlete, with the reputation of being the fastest runner in the institution. After attendance for a time at the university of Virginia, **Mr. Grady** began newspaper work. He was on a visit to Atlanta when he volunteered to go as the **Constitution's** correspondent on a projected excursion.

His letters, which appeared one every day for a week, were brilliantly written and attracted attention. For a while after this pleasant experience he edited a daily paper in Rome, but, in 1871, removed to Atlanta, the progressive metropolis of his part of the country. There he assisted in the publication and editing of the **Atlanta Herald**, a clever newspaper conducted with a generosity which led to its discontinuance, and the increased success of the **Constitution**, which had been its rival. **Grady's** reputation induced his ready employment as correspondent of the **Louisville Courier-Journal** and of the **New York Herald**. His work proved of industrial value to Georgia, and increased his popularity. With money made by hard work and some speculation—or a biographer mistakes—**Grady** bought a third interest in the **Atlanta Constitution**, for which paper he writes with considerable irregularity as to the length of his effusions, but always with the fluency and crispness which are an index to their authorship. His work for the leading magazines is welcomed by their editors for its "informational" value, and its broad and liberal spirit. **Mr. Grady** possesses the sympathetic and genial temperament of the orator. He is large-hearted and popular, and the circle of his helpful and generous influence is ever extending.

The list of those invited to the dinner of the New England society was large, and included many distinguished men. That list had been made out with care, and included **Chauncey M. Depew**, **Horace Russell**, **Gen. William T. Sherman**, **Maj.-Gen. Schofield**, and **Rev. T. DeWitt Talmage**. There was one name, however, which was not very familiar. When **President Russell** introduced **Grady** the company beheld a smooth-faced, medium-sized, modest-looking man, who appeared even younger than he was. **Mr. Grady** at once landed into his subject, "The New South," with a grace which showed that he knew what he had to say and knew how to say it. He touched a popular chord, and no man has ever created a greater sensation, the more so as it was wholly unexpected. He referred to **Mr. Lincoln** in the following terms:

"Great types, like valuable plants, are slow to flower and fruit, but from the union of these colonists came he who stands as the first typical American, the first who comprehended within himself all the strength and greatness, all the majesty and grace of this republic—**Abraham Lincoln**. He was the sum of Puritan and Cavalier, for in his ardent nature were fused the virtues of both, and in the depths of his great soul the faults of both were lost; but he was greater than Puritan, greater than Cavalier, in that he was American, and in that in his homely form were first gathered the vast and sterling forces of this republic, charging it with such tremendous meaning as to elevate it above human suffering that martyrdom, though infamously aimed, came as a fitting crown to a life consecrated from the cradle to human liberty."

His references to the negro and to the relationship, both present and prospective, between the white and colored races, were eloquent and in the best spirit. He said:

"The relations of the southern people with the negro are close and cordial. We remember with what fidelity he guarded our defenseless women and children, whose husbands and fathers were fighting against his freedom. To his eternal credit be it said that whenever he struck a blow for his own liberty he fought in open battle, and when at last he raised his black and humble hands that the shackles might be struck off, those hands were innocent of wrong against his helpless charges, and worthy to be taken in loving grasp by every man who honors loyalty and devotion. Ruffians have maltreated him, rascals have misled him, but his treatment in the south to-day is in honorable protest against injustice to this simple and sincere people. Faith has been kept

with him in spite of calumnious assertions to the contrary by those who assume to speak for us or by frank opponents. Faith will be kept with him in the future if the south holds her reason and integrity. The new south is ennobled of her new work. Her soul is stirred with the breath of new life. As she stands, full-statured and equal among the people of the earth, breathing the keen air and looking out upon the limitless horizon, she understands that her emancipation came because, in the inscrutable wisdom of God, her honest purpose was crossed and her brave armies beaten. This is said in no spirit of time-serving and apology. I should be unjust to the south if I did not make this plain in this presence."

When the white people of the southern states universally endorse and adopt such sentiments, then the great race problem will be virtually solved, and what was the greatest menace to the union will be its great strength and mainstay.

**Grady** was made much of on his return to Atlanta; honors are being heaped upon him thick and fast, and it is even suggested to put him upon the democratic ticket for the vice-presidency of the republic at the next election.

## THE POLICE COURT CASES.

Selling Liquor to Minors—The Magistrate Ferretes a Pun—A Single Drunk.

A Princess street saloon keeper was charged with allowing whiskey to be sold on his premises to a person under sixteen years of age. He pleaded "not guilty." The boy **Norris**, who, it is supposed to have got the liquor, gave his evidence. He toddled into the box and began to sob. When **McGuire**, who appeared for the defendant, saw the boy he enquired his age. His father said he was eight years old. The lawyer objected to his testimony as he was too young to understand the nature of an oath. His father was then sworn. He said his wife had got the whiskey alluded to and had sent it to him by his son. Hearing this statement the magistrate said **Mr. Norris** ought not to have come to court. **Mr. Glidden** said it was not necessary as he had a witness who could prove that **Mrs. Norris** was not at the saloon at the time the liquor was procured. **Officer Burnett** took the stand. He said that on the night of the 25th Dec. he spoke to a boy who was crying opposite to the premises of the defendant. This lad's name was **McCann**. When asked what he wanted he said he was waiting for young **Norris** who was in the defendant's saloon getting whiskey for his father. A few minutes after witness saw young **Norris** come out of the building with something buttoned under his coat. Witness did not know what it was. He did not know **Mrs. Norris** was in the saloon as he did not go into it. **Mr. McGuire** contended that the evidence produced was not sufficient to convict his client. The magistrate innocently perpetrated a pun, in addressing **Officer Burnett**: "It is a pity that you did not search **Norris** and discover what he had under his coat. It would have been very good proof." He adjourned the case until to-morrow morning so as to allow **Mrs. Norris** to give her evidence.

**Mr. McGuire** said he did not think the clause in the license act, relating to minors, applied to messengers. The magistrate said that he would make it apply to messengers if they were children under sixteen years of age and the cases before him.

**John Nolan**, for drunkenness, was sent to gaol for thirty days. The magistrate wanted to know how it was that he could find money to buy whiskey and could not afford to pay for attendance at the general hospital.

## THE BRITISH CABINET.

Lord Randolph Churchill Forming a Cave—His Action Condemned.

**LONDON**, Jan. 9.—**Lord Lansdowne** declines **Lord Salisbury's** offer of a place in his cabinet. It is not expedient in the national interest to sever his connection with the Dominion at present.

The war preparations are much discussed. Liberals believe that if the preparations mean war, they will lead to the fall of the ministry, as **Churchill** would be the first to denounce any interference in continental quarrels. He is busy forming a cave, and is being joined by prominent members of the Tory democratic wing.

**Lord Idlesleigh**, the foreign secretary, is at present indisposed to take any other office, but will probably reconsider his determination.

The grievance of the men is not known, but is believed to be the failure of **President Powers** to keep his part of the agreement recently made with the men. A **Charleston** car started this morning, manned by non-union drivers and conductors, who are protected by policemen.

## AFFAIRS OF THE WORLD.

TELEGRAMS FROM THE EARTHS  
FOUR QUARTERS GIVEN.

The Little Things That Affect Canadians—Flashes From Europe and what they Portend—A Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

**Thos. A. Edison**, New York, is ill. A fire in **Ingersoll** burned **Mrs. Scott** to death.

**John Roach**, the great New York ship-builder, is dead.

A tablet, memorial of the late **Dr. Tassie**, will be erected at **Galt**.

**Ex-Ald. Davids**, a retired Toronto druggist, expired suddenly in his chair.

**Gladstone** personally denies that he is prepared to modify the home rule bill.

The north-west salvationists intend shortly to commence work among the Indians.

**Eleanor Elizabeth Tudor**, Montreal, will apply to parliament for a bill of divorce from her husband.

The **Prince of Wales** has taken a year's lease of **Lord Kilwarden's** mansion in county Dublin.

A strike of 39,000 miners in **Northumberland** is imminent, owing to a dispute about wages.

**Catharine Taucher**, of Belleville, has been committed for trial at **Buffalo** on a charge of smuggling.

**Moonlighters** in **Cork** attacked and maltreated **Clerk Darrus**, of the county sessions. **Darrus's** injuries are serious.

**E. J. Jenkinson**, the assistant Irish under-secretary for police and crime, intends, says the **Pall Mall Gazette**, to resign.

There are 250,000 women in **London** who earn their living by the needle who make no more than \$1.50 a week.

The prevailing opinion throughout the foreign legations in **Washington** inclines to the view that peace will prevail in Europe.

The **Ottawa** police commissioners recommend the institution of a police telegraph signal and patrol wagon service in **Ottawa**.

**Druggist Joseph Mauri**, **Brooklyn**, N. Y., three of whose children died on Tuesday of small-pox, died on Friday. The two remaining children will die.

The church of **Ascension**, **Hamilton**, was burned to the ground on Saturday night, only a portion of the stone walls and the tower being left standing.

The **Eastern** dairymen's association wants the Ontario government to increase its grant. It would like the \$10,000 given to the Agricultural and Arts association.

Solicitors will apply to the Ontario legislature for an act to unite the **Woodstock** and **Toronto** Baptist colleges under the name of the **McMaster University**.

**Thomas H. Johnston**, assistant commissioner of crown lands, **Toronto**, died suddenly on Saturday afternoon from heart disease. He was 77 years of age.

**George W. Childs**, **Philadelphia Ledger**, has given away \$25,000 as Christmas presents. Each of his large force of employes received an envelope with something in it.

Serious charges have been made against chief of police **Murray**, **Winnipeg**, for allowing prisoners to be taken out of their cells on the day of civic elections to vote.

The **Frankfort Zeitung** says **Turkey** has joined **Germany** and **Russia** in the adoption of a common Balkan policy, and that they are trying to induce **France** to co-operate.

**Judge Kelley**, **Charlottetown**, P.E.I., has been violently assaulted by drunken men. He was remonstrating with them for stealing a pair of skates when they set upon him.

**P. W. Ellis**, **Toronto**, is suing the **Richelieu** navigation company to recover \$4,500, the value of the contents of a vessel aboard the **Passport** at the time that vessel foundered at **Cornwall**.

A fire occurred in **Alcazar** palace, occupied by the military academy at **Toledo**, Spain, yesterday. The library was completely destroyed and several persons burned to death.

**Judge Barrett** to-day denied the motion for a change of venue in the case of **Jacob Sharp**, **New York**, who was indicted for bribing aldermen to pass the **Broadway** railway franchise.

The federation of trades unions in the States includes 34,000 cigarmakers, 22,000 brick layers, 40,000 coal miners, 20,000 printers, 27,000 iron moulders, and 30,000 carpenters and joiners.

In **Butler**, Ky., **M. S. Hewitt's** mother and sister objected to a match and refused to allow him to bring his bride to their home. He secured a razor, cut his throat, and after walking 200 yards dropped dead.

In view of the dissatisfaction of the knights of labour regarding the salary of \$5,000 to the master workman it is interesting to note that the **New York World** signifies its willingness to give **Mr. Powderly** \$5,000 a year to devote his services exclusively to that paper.

There is said to be a prospect of the **C.P.R.** establishing their works for building passenger cars in **Perth**, as the company have failed to come to any arrangement with the city of **Montreal** for fixing the shops in that city.

Among the sufferers by the burning of **McFarlane's** hotel, **North Bay** was a newly married couple of **Pembroke**, **Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Montgomery**. They had to jump from the window in their night clothes, their jewelry, money and clothing, were all burned.

A man named **Walshaw**, of **Toronto**, and his wife commenced to drink heavily on Monday and on a neighbor entering the house on Saturday he found **Walshaw** lying dead on the floor, and his wife in a state of unconsciousness. Empty whiskey bottles lay around the room.

## Desperate Work of Strikers.

**SAN FRANCISCO**, Jan. 10.—The street car strikers yesterday afternoon attempted to blow up a dummy on the **Geary** street cable road. The wood work of the dummy was wrecked, but no one was injured. The explosion was heard at a distance of several blocks, and the windows were rattled.
