





Exciting Scenes in Clare-A Hot Tossle With the Moonlighters.

DUBLIN, Jan. 11. - As an outcome of the prohibition of the nationalist meeting, announced to be held to-day on the occasion of the threatened wholesale evictions at Rosslea, there was a collision between crowd of about 4,000 persons, who were waiting to receive Mr. Dillon, and a force of police and a draft of village peasants, the latter of whom were armed with sticks. The police used their sticks freely and succeeded in dispersing the crowd. Mr. Dillon, and the catholic clergymen who were present, while strongly protesting against the action of the police, persuaded the people to return to their homes.

Exciting scenes were witnessed yesterday in county Clare. While a number of bailiffs, accompanied by 100 policemen, were evicting tenants in Maynoe, a wild district, the chapel bells were rung and horns sounded. The people quickly assembled, headed by the priests. Three evicted tenants were reinstated as caretakers, and in two instances the bailiffs had to abandon cheirattempts to evict the tenants, owing to the menaces of the population. The police were unable to quell the disorders, and withdrew from the scene. During the disturbance Father O'Flynn, Inspector Heard and several policemen were injured by being hit with stones. A gang of armed and disguished moonlighters attacked the house of a farmer named Connor at Mount Collins last night. The family resisted and overpowered the assailants and captured four of them. The

four were found to be cousins of Connor. There were six men in the attacking party. Upon nearing the house they opened fire on Mr. Connor and the members of his family. The farmer, who is an old man, and his wife and children seized chairs and fire irons and vigorously attacked the marauders. A desperate struggle ensued, during which Mrs. Connor and one of the sons were badly cut with a scythe.

DUBLIN, Jan. 11.—A series of evictions was begun on the Winn estate in Kerry today. As the tenants were evicted their houses were burned. Intense excitement prevails in the district, and it is probable there will be bloodshed.
