TYPOGRAPHERS' UNIONS.

DRIGIN AND HISTORY INTERNATIONAL BODY.

Recent Work of the Union-D. M. Pascoe, the Youthful Secretary-Treasurer. An Office of Responsibility That Has Been Satisfactorily Filled.

[Special Correspondence.]

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 11.—The oldest national trades organization in America is the International Typographical union. There are 219 subordinate unions located in the important cities and towns of the United States and Canada. The first meeting of printers on this continent was held in New York city in 1850, when the proposition to form a representative national body for mutual protection was made and favorably received. J. W. Peregoy, of Baltimore, was chosen president. Two years later, at Cincinnati, the National Typographical union was formally organized, and M. C. Brown, of Philadelphia, was elected president. In 1869 the convention assembled at Albany, when the Canadian unions desiring to be admitted, it was decided to change the name to the International Typographical union. Membership cards are now exchanged with all foreign typographical organizations. At the last session of the International, held

at Pittsburg, Pa., last June, a member of the Philadelphia delegation, D. M. Pascoe, was announced as a candidate for the important office of secretary-treasurer. There was great rivalry among the several candidates, but Mr. Pascoe was elected, and the efficient manner in which he has since discharged the duties of the office is conclusive evidence of the fact that the confidence of the International Typographical union was not misplaced.



Mr. Pascoe was born in the city of Philadelphia about twenty-six years ago. He learned his trade in the composing room of Lippincott's Magazine. He has always been noted for his great energy and business ability. In 1884 he started The Tocsin, a Philadelphia labor organ, of which he is still the proprietor and editor. He is possessed of pleasing manners, and is extremely popular with the craft. Mr. Pascoe enjoys the distinction of being the youngest man who has ever been elected to an International office.

The next session of the International Typographical union will be held at Buffalo in June. The present officers are: President, William Aimison, No. 342 Cedar street, Nashville; first vice-president, Joseph F. Rymer, New York; second vice-president, Charles Gamewell, P. O. box 101, Washington; secretary-treasurer, D. M. Pascoe, No. 728 Filbert street, Philadelphia; chief organizer, David P. Boyer, P. O. box 76, Columbus, O.; secretary-treasurer of insurance, H. Thomas Elder, Herald office, Boston; trustees Childs-Drexel fund, August Donath, Washington; James J. Dailey, Philadelphia; Frank S. Pelton, Chicago.

The union has done good work for the printers of this country and Canada, and new unions are being constantly organized.




