

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

not Found in the Cargo. Yesterday the case of McKay vs. McBean was heard before Judge Price in chambers. It was an action brought by R. O. McKay, of Hamilton, against A. G. McBean, of Toronto, for \$116.76, the deductions made on a cargo of grain delivered at the Kingston and Montreal forwarding company's wharf from Detroit. The captain signed bill of lading calling for 17,998 bushels of corn. When delivered only 17,768 bushels of corn were realized. The captain was charged with the shortage at 48c per bushel, under a clause in the bill of lading which made the craft responsible for shortages. The owner claimed that the shortage clause was not binding. The judge reserved his decision. In connection with the above case gentlemen interested in shipping recall the decision of a U.S. judge at Buffalo in the case of the schr. Law, the owners of which sued for the residue of freight, the rate on 496 bushels of a shortage having been deducted. The judge held that the cast-iron bill of lading usually signed was one sided and could not be considered binding, and ordered the payment of the full freight. If it were proven that the amount of the cargo received was delivered then the captains could not be compelled to pay for that he never had.

## A TORY BULL-DOZER FINED.

W. Hamilton Fined for his Attack on a Reform Scrutineer.

Belleville, Jan. 19. - Yesterday William Hamilton, a tory wage, earner at Plainfield, was fined \$29 and costs for assaulting Edward Hicks, the reform scrutineer. Mr. Hicks challenged Hamilton's vote at the late provincial elections and after voting he committed the assault. The costs amounted to \$12.40, making a total of \$32.40. Hamilton is liable, under the Ontario Election Act, to a fine of \$50, one half of which goes to the private prosecutor. This fine is recoverable in the division court, and the reformers intend to follow this thing to the end.
