

OUR COAST DEFENSES.


THE ADVANCES MADE IN HARBOR FORTIFICATIONS.

The Old Forts Now Practically Useless. The Largest Gun in the World-The Death Dealing Torpedo-Gruson's Impenetrable Cupola.

The question of coast defenses for this country has been actively before the public for fully eighty years. The same arguments which were originally used, pro and con, hold good to-day. The system, as it at present exists, was conceived and carried out by Gen. Joseph G. Totten, who completed the work about twenty years ago. At that time the forts of which Fort Wadsworth is a good example, were considered well nigh impregnable when adopted, but with the increased penetrative power of modern artillery the usefulness of these old time fortifications has departed.





During the past few months the press of the senbould cities has had a great deal to say regarding the needs of more modern defenses and the initial number of Scribner's magazine contains an article on the same subject by Capt. F. V. Greene, United States engineer. Capt. Greene holds that while other nations have been advancing, we have stood still and urges the necessity of action at once. Not that there is any danger that a foreign country will be able to subjugate the United States, but it is feared that in case of hostilities the ships of a foreign power would be able to completely destroy the magnificent chains of cities that are strung along the coasts of the two ocrans and those of the great lakes. This is rendered possible largely by the big guns made at the Krupp works, Essen, Germany.



A KRUPP HUNDRED-TON GUN.

This gun, as illustrated, is mounted upon a sea coast carriage. The following dimensions will serve to convey some idea of its enormous size: Length, 45 feet 6 inches; diameter of bore, 16 inches; weight 115 tons; charge of powder, 800 pounds; weight of projectile, 2,300 pounds; muzzle energy, 55,000 foot tons. This gun, with the exception of one of the same size, the property of the Italian government, is the largest piece of ordnance in the world.

But powerful as are these monster guns, means have always been found for withstanding their force. The port of Antwerp, Belgium, has among its defenses one of Gruson's iron cupolas, which has been tested and



GRUSON'S IMPENETRABLE CUPOLA. found to be almost impervious to shot or The claims of this cupola, which seems to be in some degree an adaptation of the principle that won for Ericsson's Monitor such fame, are being pushed vigorously, and it is believed by those who advocate it that its adoption, armed with proper guns, would render our ports impreg-

GEN. THOMAS MOONLIGHT.

Nominated for Governor of Wyoming by

Gen. Thomas Moonlight, who has been named for the position of governor of Wyoming territory, is a native of Arboath, Forfarshire, Scotland, and was born Nov. 10, 1833. When still a lad be came to America, serving as cabin



boy on the voyage here. Deciding to make the west his home he settled in Kansas in 1857, and was a farmer there when the civil war broke out. In 1861 he went to the front as a private soldier in the cavalry ranks, and by ...critorious conduct

rose to the rank of GEN. MOONLIGHT. colonel. At the cessation of hostilities he was breveted brigadier general.

Gen. Moonlight was a Douglas Democrat originally, but became a Republican in 1864. In 1868 he was chosen secretary of state by the Republicans, but two years later he renounced that party and again became a Democrat. From 1872 to 1874 inclusive he served in the state senate. In 1884, having in the meantime held various other positions of trust in his party, he was chosen elector at large for Cleveland and Hendricks. In August, 1886, he was nominated for governor and polled 116,000 votes. His nomination to the governorship of Wyoming was a surprise generally, but to no one more than to himself.

From Bad to Worse?

If you ask an experienced newspaper man if it would not be possible to secure public support in New York for a journal that should rigidly exclude divorce suits and similar scandalous matter from its columns the chances are he would tell you that such a journal would fall flat. His defense, when you tax him with publishing articles that are not fit to be read, is that they are read, whether they are fit to be or not; and he will insist, moreover, that they are read by the very people who would be least expected to read them. He may be right in his cynical view or he may be wrong. The fact remains that most of the papers seem to be going from bad to worse in this respect; and no one can contemplate the probable effect upon the morals of the community of several years of this pandering to the vilest instincts of human nature without a feeling of serious concern. - New York Cor. Poston Tanscript.

GOOD HEALTH.

Some Useful Suggestions About How to Get and Keep It.

Dr. Brown Sequard, in & paper on "Catching Cold and its. Prevention," includes under the name "cold" various acute inflammations attacking the nasal, pharyngeal, laryngeal, tracheal or bronchial mucous membranes. The neck and feet are considered to be the specially sensitive parts. To prevent cold one has to harden these areas. This is done by each day blowing a stream of cold air by means of a bellows or elastic bag upon the neck, and immersing the fert in cold water. The air is at first only slightly cold, but is each day made colder until the neck can stand an excessive degree.

The water in which the feet are immersed is also made colder daily, starting with 90 degs. F. and gradually reducing to 38 degs. F.

Hints for the Schoolroom.

Freedom of position : n l frequent change is of great importance for children. School children, when obliged to stand for any length of time, should not be required to place their feet close together, for this gives so small a base of support that increased effort is necessary to maintain the equilibrium of the body. If they are required to sit with the body perfectly erect and face squarely to the front, it should be only for short intervals of time. The muscles become easily fatigued and one set should not be kept upon a strain for a long period. Desks that are too low give children the habit of stooping at their work, and are a fruitful source of round shoulders.

Prevention of Wrinkles.

A well known authority on skin diseases, advises, for the prevention of wrinkles and "black heads," the following simple remedy: To one quart of good whisky add four tablespoonfuls of borax. Bathe the face each morning in a pint of tepid water, to which has been added about one gill of this whisky and borax preparation. When the patient inclines to pimples and the troublesome "black heads," it is further recommended that all sweets, pastries and greasy foods be avoided, the diet having much influence in all matters pertaining to the skin and complexion.

Using Teeth for Scissors.

Many ladies have the habit, when sewing, of biting off threads instead of cutting them with seissors. For either natural or artificial teeth this is bad and soon necessitates repairs. The edge of the teeth becomes very rough by the breaking of the enamel when thread is bitten off many times at the same place on the tooth, as is liable to be the care, for all the muscular force exerted by the jaws is centered upon the small space measured by the width of a thread.

Remedies for Burns.

Remedies for burns are many and it is well that this is so, for if one is not at hand another may be. Vaseline, linseed or sweet oil or warm mutton tallow are applied to the burn and powdered corn starch or wheat flour dusted over and soft linen or cotton cloth wrapped around. Air must be kept from a burn, and the oil and flour do this as well as form a healing salve. One part carbolic acid to eight parts olive oil is said to be one of the best of remedics for burns and scalds. Linen rags are saturated with the lotion; they are then spread smoothly over the burne I part and covered with oil silk or gutta percha tissue to exclude the air.
