YOUNG FOLKS' COLUMN.

A NOTABLE ENGLISH GARDEN AF-FORDS A PLEASING PUZZLE.

The Marquis of Kildare and a Monkey Hero-How the Tailor Bird Sews Its Nest Together With Long, Stout Fiber.

The art of sewing we would certainly suppose to be of man's invention. But not so; before his appearance needle and thread joined two objects together. We find that he has only followed in the footsteps of a little animal called the sylvia sutoria or tailor bird. The wonderful skill, patience and loving instinct that birds show in constructing nests for their young is also very apparent in this remarkable bird.

A native of India, the tailor bird builds in the trees, pendant from a young branch, an airy nest that sways with the breeze, light, graceful and safe from harm, because it is hardly to be distinguished from the foliage.

As may be seen in the cut, the tailor bird chooses a leaf of suitable size, on each edge of which it pierces a row of holes with its beak, as a shoemaker might do with his awl. Then the bird strips off from some plant a long, stout fiber, which it passes back and forth through the holes, drawing the edges of the leaf toward each other until it forms a sort of inverted hollow cone. Now it seeks among the plants a soft. white down, with which it lines the leafy hollow. Surely few nestlings see the light in such a dainty, warm and elegant home as the little tailors! The old tailor bird is not chary of work, for it often builds the nest with two leaves and sews up two seams instead of one.

A Marquis and a Monkey.

The following story of a monkey hero is vouched for by good authority. It runs in this wise: A large orang-outang, which is the largest species of monkey except the gorilla, was very much attached to his master and to the baby boy who was the pet of the whole family. One day a fire suddenly broke out in the house, and everybody was running here and there to put it out, while the little boy in his nursery was almost forgotten, and when they thought of him the staircase was all in flames. What could be done! As they were looking up and wondering a large, hairy hand and arm opened the window, and presently the monkey appeared with the baby in his arms, and carefully climbed down over the porch and brought the child safely to his nurse. Nobody else could have done it, for a man cannot climb like a monkey and is not nearly so strong. You may imagine how the faithful creature was praised and petted after that. This is a true story, and the child who was saved was the young Marquis of Kildare.

A Labyrinthine Puzzle.

This maze is a correct ground plan of one of the gardens of the palace of Hampton court, on the Thames river, England, and furnishes a pleasing puzzle for our young folks, in addition to giving them an inside view of a notable garden.

No legendary tale is attached to it, of which we are aware, but its labyrinthine walks occasion much amusement to the numerous holiday parties who frequent the palace grounds. The partitions between the walks are hedges of clipped hornbeam, and are about five feet in height. The puzzle is to get into the center, where seats are placed under two lofty trees, and many are the disappointments experienced before the end is attained; and even then the trouble is not over, it being quite as difficult to get out as to get in. It is suggested to our readers that, following the paths with the point of a pencil, they endeavor to trace their way to the center and back again to the entrance.

A Cat Adopts Baby Rats.

Joseph Messenger, a well known farmer, who enjoys a reputation for truthfulness, credita the following story told of his cat, which is famous in the neighborhood where he resides for her record as a successful ratter and mouser: A few days ago, as Mr. Messenger entered his barn, he saw a big rat jump out of a barrel and scamper away. The farmer looked in the barrel and saw six young rats which were upable to get out. He went and brought his famous rat killing cat and put ber in the barrel as the quickest way of ridding the premises of the six incipient pests. To his great surprise she did not make short shrift of them, but on the contrary took the rat family under her protection and treated them with as much consideration and affection as though they had been a litter of her own.

The news of this remarkable whim on the part of the Messenger rat destroyer soon spread to the neighbors, and they flocked to the barn to see the curious spectacle. The constant appearance of strangers at the barrel evidently alarmed the cat for the safety of her proteges, for she began to carry them in her mouth, as she might her kittens, to a place of greater exclusion and safety. At this point the farmer drew the line, and slaughtered the cat's family of ratlings, much to her apparent grief.

Instructive Optical Trick.

A pleasing optical game may be performed by giving a ring to some person, or putting it at a little distance, in such a position that the plane of it shall be turned toward his face, and then desire this person to shut one of his eves

and endeavor to push a crooked stick through the ring. To his surprise he will seldom if ever succeed. The reason of the failures is evident; being unaccustomed to use one eye only, he cannot judge of the distance correctly, and, of course, errs; but a person having only one eye would not fail of achieving the trick.

The Correct Positi on for Boxing

When standing up for a turn with the gloves, look your man full in the eye, don't lose his gaze for an instant, for it is the infallible mirror which will inform you of what his brain is evolving before his limbs have had time to execute it. Remember always that in general the left hand is the weapon of assault, the right being held for the purpose of defense. Of course this remark does not imply that you are not to let drive with your left and right in rapid succession, which is often done when opportunity offers.

Advance your left foot forward, therefore, planting it flat and firmly on the ground. The right foot should be from to fourteen inches in the man of the lat.

Let the fists be lightly closed when you are sparring round, but tighten them simultaneously with the delivery of a blow or when warding off your adversary. This seems perhaps a slight point to strike for, but a very short experience will show its wisdom and importance when put into prac-

Let the head be, if anything, inclined a trifle to the right, and do not protrude the chin. Although both eyes should look straight into those of your opponent, the left cheek should be slightly turned toward him, in order to prevent a plump blow between the eyes taking equally bad effect on both, -Charles E. A Complete Life Buny.

A young Irish sailor named Welch, in the United States navy, is credited with having invented a remarkable and complete life buoy. It is a circular belt in wheh are mounted six vertical hollow tubes. These are each filled with, first, Greek fire in sufficient quantity to burn fifty seconds; second, Roman candles that explode every ten' seconds, and third, with a sort of rocket to which are attached life lines. These, as the rocket explodes, are projected in six different directions, giving the drowning man as many chances for his life. - New York Sun.

Frogs as Big as Porkers.
