## AFFAIRS IN IRELAND.

### THE FEELING EVINCED OVER THE EVICTION OF TENANTS.

G.n. Buller Could not Stand the Suffering of the People-The Plan of Campaign Continued With More or Less Success-The Way Being Cleared for a Re-union of the Liberal Party.

Dublin, Jan. 22.—The evictions at Glenleigh, county Kerry, were suspended to-day owing to the absence of the sheriff; twentythree men are arranged before the magistrate at Killorglin for obstructing the work of the sheriff during the past week in making evictions at Glenleigh. Immediately after the arraignment a mass meeting of the citizens was held to express sympathy with the prisoners, and seven of the speakers openly denounced the evictions as tyrannical and barbarous. Forty-one ejectment decrees have been granted against the tenants on the Londonderry estates belonging to

Skinner's company of London. DUBLIN, Jan. 23. - Evictions at Glenbeigh, county Kerry, were suspended owing to the absence of the sheriff. Twenty-three men were arraigned before the magistrate at Killorglin for obstructing the work of the sheriff during the past week in making evic-

tions at Glenbeigh. Rev. Mr. Anderson, protestant rector at Drinagh, county Cork, amazed his flock by preaching a vigorous sermon on the sin of land-grabbing. He has long been boycotted by the local landlords for espousing the national cause.

Twenty-three prisoners from Glenbeigh arrived at Killorglin on Saturday. They were met by a large crowd, who cheered them and hooted the police. Mr. Dillon and others were present in court. The magistrates adjourned the case until Monday.

John O'Connor, M.P., at Ballinalee, Longford, produced a small potato raised in Gweedore, which he promised to show in the house of commons as a sample product of the soil of that district.

Joseph Chamberlain, at Hawick, expressed the belief that, from what had passed at the conference of radicals and liberals, a complete agreement with the liberal leaders might be attained. Ireland, he said, has too long been the playground of paid agitators. The tenants would never be satisfied while they had the hope of getting land for nothing, which hope formed the basis of the plan of campaign. This plan was the most dishonest conspiracy ever devised. Mr. Chamberlain was hopeful that the question of antonomy would be settled upon the principle of providing legislative authority for the Irish to manage their domestic affairs, with a provision preserving the rights of minorities and the integrity of

A rush was made for the other end of the sewer, and men, secured by ropes, jumped into the water and waited for the children to appear. Bertha came first under water, and Blanche followed on top.
