THUNDER IN THE EAST.

The Agitation for War Continued-A Proposal Made to the l'orte.

VIENNA, Jan. 24.—Although the Bulgarian situation has improved the military preparations of the Austro Hungarian government continue unabated. In the event of the mobilization three great armies will be formed, each corps having no less than 250,000 men. The commanders for these corps have already been designated. It is believed that these gigantic preparations have been undertaken less from fear of war with Russia concerning Bulgaria than with the view of the contingency of war between France and Germany, which would cause additional eastern complications.

VIENNA, Jan. 24.—An order, prohibiting the exportation of horses, is daily expected. ATHENS, Jan. 25. - Greece is busy with preparations for war. All the arsenals are working night and day.

London, Jan. 25.—The foreign office denies the statement that it has official knowledge, that the relations between France and Germany point to the imminence

VIENNA, Jan. 25.—It is reported that the powers have resolved to revive the conference at Constantinople to settle the Bulgarian question.

Sofia, Jan. 25.—Zankoff submitted to the grand vizier at Constantinople the following proposals for the settlement of the Bulgarian difficulty: That a regency be dismissed, a new ministry be formed, the foreign and interior portfolio to be given to Zankoffists, and the war portfolio to Gen. Kaulbars; that a new sobranje be elected; that the constitution be modified, and that the Prince of Mengrelia be elected to the throne. The grand vizier replied that porte could not accept the proposals.

THE PLAN OF CAMPAIGN.

It Goes on Despite the Court's Action-Rejoicing at Glenbeigh.

DUBLIN, Jan. 24.—The treasurer of the Loughrea branch of the national league, and five other members have been served with writs, summoning them to surrender the moneys placed in their hands as trustees under the plan of campaign by the tenants on the Clanricarde estates. A writ has been served on John Dillon to recover from him the amount of his recognizances already pledged in the government actions against him for agitating in favour of the plan of campaign, the ground being alleged continuance of the agitation. Mr. Dillon will resist the writ, and thus the whole issue will become one to be tried before a jury.

The magistrate before whom the Glenbeigh tenants were tried, acquitted the prisoners. To-night the hillsides for miles around were ablaze with bonfires in honour of the event. Forty bullocks, valued at \$3,500, have been deprived of their tails by unknown persons on the Marquis of Waterford's Curraghmore estate.

DUBLIN, Jan. 25. - Mr. Redmond, member of parliament, speaking at Kilburry yesterday, said that if England refused to reddress the Irish grievances, constitutionally, there were strong arms and stout hearts enough in Tipperary and Wexford to meet the enemies of Ireland on a widely different field. THE BISHOP'S POSITION.

He is Not Against Any Political Party-Who Are His Enemies!

At Trenton on Sunday Bishop Cleary, according to the Belleville Ontario, afterspeak ing of his action in the recent provincial campaign, said he was anxious that his stand in the present political contest should be well understood. He was not a politician, and nobody ever heard him speak for or against any political party in this country. Efforts had been made to obtain his influence and power, but he always replied that he knew no political party-one was the same to him as the other. He stood with crosier in hand at the sanctuary of the church and the political party that endeavored to enter thereat was his enemy and his foe. To enter that sanctuary he would pass over him, and no political party in Canada or elsewhere could terrify him or make him yield one iota to those presumptuous and unwarranted intruders. All honor and glory was due to the protestants of Ontario who manfully withstood, notwithstanding the great inducements which were held out, to join the "no popery" cry of the tory party, and sever the social relations existing between them and their faithful catholic

A Deluge of Rain.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—Dispatches from Brisbane, the capital of Queensland, state that the colony has been swept by a fearful cyclone, accompanied by a rain fall of such extraordinary copiousness that twenty inches of water fell in a short time. The result has been disastrous floods in Brisbane. Some thoroughfarers are submerged to a depth of 20 feet. The city is entirely cut off by the floods from its suburbs. Reports say that many persons were drowned.

Wales Wants Relief.

CARDIFF, Jan. 25. - The liberals of Wales, in a conference here yesterday, resolved to introduce into parliament, during the coming session, a land bill for Wales, securing to tenants a continuity of tenure and compensation for improvement.

WHERE A LARGE SHARE OF THE PUBLIC MONEY GOES.

Bonusing Railways in Which the Members of Parliament are Directly Interested-The Row Between Chapleau and the Government-It is Patched up for the Time Being.

Under the pretence of encouraging railway enterprise the government of Sir John Macdonald made a wholesale onslaught on the dominion treasury. Ministers and members of parliament supporting them shared in this scandalous division of public spoil. The amount thus subdivided was very large.

The policy of the government in giving these subsidies was not so much to promote the construction of important railroads requiring such aid as it was to enable their supporters to make money by the sale of charters or contracts, or stock, or as presidents and directors, and so obtain the reward they expected for their political services. notorious cases :

Palmite, a Cuban Dish.

With no intention of making my letters a circulating cookery book, I have another Cuban dish to tell you about, one which few foreigners have tasted, and which even many Cubans-those living in cities-have passed quite a lifetime without tasting. When it is known that in order to get the "palmito" one of the handsomest and tallest trees of Cuba has to be cut down, and thus entirely destroyed, just to furnish a dish of palmito for two or three meals only, it should-with that very human appreciation of the rare and difficult of acquisition-hold a high place in

the culinary art. The palmito is the heart of that green, fresh looking part of the trunk of the palm enveloped by the "yagua," which is near the top of the tree, just below its spreading leaves. The tree down, this green portion of the trunk is cut open, and an ivory white, transparent looking substance, the tenderest part about eighteen inches in circumference and as many inches long, is taken out. Thisthe palmito-is eaten as salad, both cooked and raw, is made into soup, is cooked in an omelette, and is used in many other dishes. Raw, as a salad, it has a delicious taste and is very palatable. Cooked, as a salad, it has no taste at all, and yet is delicious. Strange contradiction! Without taste, it gives to the mouth a fresh, delightfully cool sensation. -Cuba Cor.
