A CRISIS NOW AT HAND.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT DEPRESSED AND DISCOURAGED.

Mr. Goschen Defeated at Liverpool-The Circumstance Regarded as Disastrously Affecting the Government-Other and Serious Phases of British Politics.

LONDON, Jan. 27. - The British parliament opened to day. The following is the Queen's speech:

"My Lords and Gentlemen-My relations with all the foreign powers are friendly. Affairs in south-eastern Europe are still unsettled, but I do not apprehend that any disturbance of the European peace will result from the unadjusted controversies which have arisen in that region. While deploring the events which compelled Prince Alexander to retire from the Bulgarian throne I have not judged it expedient to interfere in the proceedings for the election of his successor until they reach a stage at which my assent is required by the Berlin treaty. The task undertaken by my government has not yet been accomplished, but a substantial advance has been made towards the assurance of external and internal tranquility. Operations in Burmah have been conducted with bravery and skill for the purpose of extirpating brigandage, which has grown during recent years of misgovernment. The bands of marauders,-by whom Upper Burmah has long been infested, have been dispersed. Many of the leaders laid down their arms, and I entertain a confident hope that a general pacification of the country will be effected during the present season. Commercial treaties have been concluded with Greece and Roumania.

"Gentlemen of the house of commons-Estimates will be submitted to you framed with careful regard to economy and efficien-

cy of public service.

"My lords and gentlemen-The condition of Ireland still requires your anxious attention. Grave crimes in that country have happily been rarer in the last few months than during a similar period of the preceding year. But the relations between the owners and occupiers of land, which in the early autumn exhibited signs of improvement, have since been seriously disturbed in some districts by the organized attempts to incite the latter class to combine against the fulfillment of their legal obligations. The efforts of the government to cope with this evil have been seriously impeded by the difficulties incident to the method at present prescribed by the statute for dealing with such offences. Your early attention will be called to the proposals for the reform of legal procedure, which seem necessary to secure a prompt and efficient administration of the criminal law. Since I last addressed you commissioners, directed to inquire into certain subjects of great importance to the national welfare of Ireland, have been actively prosecuting their labors. The reports of the commission in the operation of recent acts dealing with the tenure and purchase of land, will shortly be laid before you, and will doubtless receive from you the early and careful attention which the serious importance of the subject demands. Bills for the improvement of the local government in England and Scotland will be laid before you. Should the circumstances render it possible they will be followed by a measure dealing with the same subject in Ireland, A bill for improving and cheapening the process of private bill legislation, for England, Scotland and Ireland, will be submitted. You will be asked to consider the measures having for their object the removal of hindrances which exist to the cheap and rapid tansfer of land, to facilitate the provision of allotments for small house holders, and to provide for a readier sale of glebe lands. The commission which I issued in 1885, to inquire into the lamentable depression un der which trade and agriculture have been suffering for many years, have presented a valuable report, which, with important evidence collected, will be laid before you. A bill for altering the mode of levying tithes in England and Wales will be submitted. With regard to Scotland you will be asked to consider measures for the reform of the universities for completing recent legislation as to the powers of secretary for Scotland, and for amending the procedure of the criminal courts. Measures dealing with the regulation of railway rates, and preventing the fraudulent use of merchandise marks, will be brought under your consideration. In the performance of these, and all your other momentous duties, I earnestly pray that the blessing of the Almighty God may attend your labors."

Scenes in the House. LONDON, Jan. 27. - As early as 8 o'clock this morning the members began to arrive in the house of commons so as to secure good seats. The first to appear was Mr. Selwyn, conservative member for Cambridgeshire. The scenes at the opening of parliament were duller than usual. Crowds about the buildings showed little if any enthusiasm, and members were evidently uncertain as to the future. Lord Randolph Churchill, when he first entered the house, tried to take the coveted seat below the gangway which he formerly occupied. He found, though that he had been forestalled by the Right Hon. Henry Chaplin, whose hat was on the seat. Lord Randolph lifted the hat examined it critically, read Chaplin's cape for a minute, then smiled and took a back seat. It is notorious that a feud exists between Lord Randolph and Mr. Chaplin. The speech from the throne excited but little interest. Weather damp and foggy.

Defeat of Mr. Goschen.

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 26.—The election for member of parliament for the exchange division of this city, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of David Duncan, was held today and resulted as follows: Mr. Neville, Gladstonian, 3,222; Mr. Goschen, conservative and unionist, 3,211. Nine votes remain in dispute, and there will be a recount to-morrow. At the last election Duncan, home ruler, received 2,920, and Bailey, conservative, 2,750. The votes were counted three times by the inspectors and a fourth time by six conservatives. The fact that the official announcement of the result was deferred until to-morrow is a certain indication of the defeat of Goschen, even if the majority against him first announced should be reduced. The defeat is felt by the members of the Car lton club to be a great party disaster. All the clubs were crowded at a late hour, and there was much excitement over | articles of jewelry.

the result. The members of the National Liberal party are jubilant. The absence of Mr. Goschen from the house of commons leaves the government in an awkward position. Even if he should be provided with an uncontested seat he cannot sit for the next ten days, and during that period there will probably be critical debates and divisions. It is reported that Sir John Mowbray is ready to resign his seat for Oxford university and be raised to the peerage. If he does resign the liberals, will contest the seat, though they have no chance of suc-

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 27.—The official count of vote in yesterday's election shows that Goschen was defeated by seven votes. The vote was: Neville, (Gladstonite) 3,217.; Goschen, 3,210.

MITCHELSTOWN, Jan. 27.—The tradesmen and tenants on the Kingston estate, have decided to sell their houses, furniture and stock in order to avoid seizure. They further intend to compel the landlords to incur the utmost legal costs by appealing against The sub-commissioners under the land act

Mr. Gladstone, writing to the Glasgow paper, says there are many circumstantial differences between Canada and Ireland, but within and under them there is a strong analogy. In the main they have the same friends and foes. Terrorism has not supported freedom in Canada and resists it in Ireland.

On Mr. Mercier alight. ing from the train he was hoisted on the shoulders of some of his friends and conveyed to a carriage containing Mayor Langelier, Hon. Mr. Pelletier and Hon. Mr. Marchand, and drawn by four prancing greys. The procession then started along the route ; it was black with people. The carriage halted at the Russell House where the mayor addressed Mr. Mercier and the vast assemblage, and Mr. Mercier replied in a most eloquent 'speech, which was almost drowned by the cheering of the multitude.
