

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

HE KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, Jan. 26.—We have had a week of unexampled dullness in the various markets. Retailers are almost driven to despair by the smallness of the trade which is now being done. Many of them do not sell \$10 worth of goods in a day. For weeks severe storms have blockaded the roads, and thaws have compelled the farmers to stay at home, and the markets have been exceedingly small.

Meats unchanged in price, viz., beef, \$4.50 to \$6.50 per cwt.; lamb and mutton, 5c to 71c per fb; pork \$6.75 to \$7 per cwt. Beef hides 6c, 7c and 8c per 16, and unrendered tallow 21 to 27c per 15.

Fowls not in great demand. The public have lost their taste, possibly because of the cost, for holiday birds. Chickens bring 50c to 75c per pair; turkeys 75c to \$1.50 each; geese 75c to \$1 each ; ducks 80c to \$1 per

Butter in good demand, and real fancy butter high priced; 30c per fb. was paid on Saturday. The merchants are offering butter at 23c to 25c for fresh and 18c to 20c per th. for packed. Stuff that is scarcely palatable can be bought at 15c to 17c per lb. Lard 10c to 121c per 10. Cheese 11c to 121c per 16. The total exports from Montreal and Portland, from May 1st to date, were 961,001 boxes, against 1,173,586 in 1886 and 1,168,113 in 1885.

The supply of vegetables fair. Potatoes worth from 60c to 75c per bag. The value of cabbages, turnips, etc., unchanged.

Grain dealers say they have had the dullest time this month they ever experienced. The farmers are offering no grain for sale at any of the markets in this section. The prevailing prices are: Barley, 40c to 45c per bush.; peas, 50c per bush.; oats, 25c to 30c per bush.; wheat, 70c to 75c per bush.; rye, 42c per bush. ; buckwheat, 35c to 38c per bush.; hay, \$8 to \$10 per ton.

In Montreal the cattle market offerings were light and chiefly composed of stock held over from last week. Butchers were pretty well supplied, which, with the disagreeable weather and bad roads, accounted for buyers being scarce. Prices were about the same as last week. Cattle ranged from 21 to 3c for common to medium; 31 to 31c for fair to good; and 4 to 44c for prime to choice fat steersand oxen per Ib. live weight. Sheep were scarce, and brought from 4 to 45c, and hogs 45 to 45c to live weight.

Canadian Honey in England. WESTBROOK, Jan. 25. - (To the Editor) You will recollect that I was a contributor to the honey sent to England last summer, and no doubt some of the readers of the have just received the last payment for my share of the honey sent over. The number of pounds sent by me, was 652 lbs.; 428 lbs. of comb honey and 224 lbs extracted honey. The amount I received for it was \$84, about | of the city. I am yours, J.S.P. \$10 to be deducted from this amount for shipping packakes. I did not get quite so much for it as I did for what I sold in the home market, but I got as much as I expected, as there was considerable expenses to come out of the price of the honey. There were four commissioners sent from here with the honey and nine saleswomen to be paid for seven weeks at the exhibition; 3,000 lbs. of honey was given away, and it is estimat ed that nearly 100,000 people tasted Canadian honey free of charge. A large quannity of the honey was sold in 2 oz tins at 2c each. The object of the commissioners was to work up a market in England for Canadian honey which object has been gained. It is now estimated that over one hundred tons of Canadian honey will find a ready market in England annually. Our exhibit was said to be the finest honey exhibit ever made in the world, there were 700 cases or 40 tons. The commissioners say that if they had been on hand with their exhibit at the I opening o: the exhibition they could have disposed of every pound of honey produced in Ontario last year. I forgot to state that in addition to the nine saleswomen they had five hands at work during the entire exhibition liquifying, handling and packing honey. It is, my intention, at the present time, for the future to put up the bulk of my honey for the English market. I am wintering fifty-eight colonies of bees, which am happy to say are in fine condition. I do not expect to lose any of them. Extracted honey sells better in England than does comb honey. This is very for-
