POLITICAL POINTERS.

Plenty of Good Men in the Field—Opposed to John White.

The reformers will run W. Needler, of Lindsay, in South Victoria.

Hon. Edward Blake addresses the electors of Montreal on next Monday evening.

Hon. R. M. Wells will contest the riding of East Bruce at the coming elections.

Sir Charles Tupper will enter the cabinet and run for Cumberland county, N.S.

A Mr. Robitaille, advocate, will oppose Mr. Laurier in Quebec East.

Matthew Hearn, Q.C., has been chosen by the liberals to contest Quebec West with Mr. McGreevey.

Mr. Pelletier will invade the county of Beauharnois, which is now held by Mr. Bergeron.

Thomas Abrahams of South Norwich, will oppose Sir Richard Cartwright in South Oxford.

Hon. William Macdougall has been unanimously nominated by the reform convention in South Grenville.

The respectable conservatives of East York have joined the liberals in their support of Hon. A. Mackenzie.

James Goldie, manufacturer of Galt, has accepted the conservative nomination in South Wellington.

Mr. Richard, who resigned his Montcalm seat in Mr. Taillon's favor, has been appointed assistant to Mr. Grenier, clerk of the executive council.

It is understood that the conservatives of Hamilton will run Mayor McKay as one of their candidates. Adam Brown will likely be his partner.

The general expectation is that the fight in Ottawa city will be extremely hot and bitter, and that one of the liberals is sure to be elected. The liberals themselves claim that they will carry both seats.

Mr. Oscar Fulton, ex-M.P. for Stormont, says Dr. Berghin has not been fairly nominated by the conservatives, and that he (Fulton) intends to contest the county as an independent supporter of the government.

An employee of the Ottawa post office department states that he has been ordered by the post-master general to go into Russell county and work for Mr. C. H. Mackintosh, and will be obliged to obey on pain of dismissal.

Rev. George May has arrived to contest Carleton county against Sir John Macdonald. Mr. May, in one election, very nearly defeated the regular conservative candidate.

Reports from Western Ontario are of the most cheering character. A. H. Harvey's election in Centre Toronto is regarded as certain. The two ridings of Essex are likely to be redeemed, also Kent, East Huron, North Middlesex, North Bruce, North Waterloo, Monck and Centre Wellington, are certain to be redeemed.

At a meeting of liberals in Deseronto, James Cameron, a conservative and former supporter of Mr. White, signified his intention of doing his best to defeat Mr. White, who had laboured, not for the good of his constituents but for his own aggrandisement, and who also expressed his willingness to meet Mr. White face to face to give his reasons for his opposition to that gentleman.

The new Tory organ is managed by Mr. L. P. Kribs, late Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto Mail, Mr. W. Philip Robinson, late editor of the West, writes the editorial, which is set up with the types of the defunct Canadian, and printed on the press of the World, all independent papers. It is said to be published at the expense of the country.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Canadian Honey in England.

WESTBROOK, Jan. 25.—(To the Editor): You will recollect that I was a contributor to the honey sent to England last summer, and no doubt some of the readers of the Whig would like to know how I came out.

I have just received the last payment for my share of the honey sent over. The number of pounds sent by me, was 652 lbs.; 428 lbs. of comb honey and 224 lbs. extracted honey. The amount I received for it was \$84, about \$10 to be deducted from this amount for shipping packages. I did not get quite so much for it as I did for what I sold in the home market, but I got as much as I expected, as there was considerable expenses to come out of the price of the honey.

There were four commissioners sent from here with the honey and nine saleswomen to be paid for seven weeks at the exhibition; 3,000 lbs. of honey was given away, and it is estimated that nearly 100,000 people tasted Canadian honey free of charge. A large quantity of the honey was sold in 2 oz. tins at 2c each. The object of the commissioners was to work up a market in England for Canadian honey which object has been gained.

It is now estimated that over one hundred tons of Canadian honey will find a ready market in England annually. Our exhibit was said to be the finest honey exhibit ever made in the world, there were 700 cases or 40 tons. The commissioners say that if they had been on hand with their exhibit at the opening of the exhibition they could have disposed of every pound of honey produced in Ontario last year. I forgot to state that in addition to the nine saleswomen they had five hands at work during the entire exhibition liquifying, handling and packing honey. It is, my intention, at the present time, for the future to put up the bulk of my honey for the English market. I am wintering fifty-eight colonies of bees, which I am happy to say are in fine condition. I do not expect to lose any of them. Extracted honey sells better in England than does comb honey. This is very fortunate for Canadian bee men as we can ship extracted honey much better and cheaper than comb.—Yours respectfully, A. BRIDGE, Westbrook, Ont.
