THE LICK OBSERVATORY LENSES. A Brief Account of Their Unpacking.

Precious Pieces of Property. The large lenses for the Lick observatory have at last reached their destination, Mt. Hamilton, in safety. These glasses have been prepared at immense cost of time and money by the Messrs. Clark, of Cambridge, and after being securely packed were placed in a special car for transportation across the continent, under the guardianship of Capt. Frazer. The San Francisco Chronicle gives a brief account of the unpacking:

The outer boxes were first removed, and then the boxes containing the lenses were taken to the south room of the observatory, where a fire had been started hours before to produce the proper temperature. When the covers of the boxes were removed it was found that the glasses had not moved out of place in the slightest degree. The wrappings of cotton flannel, forty yards to each glass, were then carefully cut away, and the glasses brushed and wiped with the utmost delicacy by Mr. Frazer, in accordance with the instructions given him by Alvan Clark. This done, the glasses, set on edge on steel rollers, were put in a cast iron cell inlaid with silver, with a space of six and a half inches between

The next move was to transport the cell, with its valuable attachment, weighing altogether 600 pounds, to the vault in the north room under the pier which supports the twelve-inch equatorial. Here every precaution had been taken to prevent moisture, and here the glasses will remain until the time comes for mounting them. Investigation shows that neither the flint nor the crown glasses had been injured at all. Each was in as good a condition as when it left the hands of the Clarks. - Exchange.

Intelligence of Two Dogs.

John Scher, the aged watchman of a Louisville furniture factory, fell on the ice on a recent cold night and broke his thigh. He tired himself out shouting, but no one came, and he was in a fair way to freeze to death, when J. L. Eshman's two Newfoundland dogs ran up. Schier had played with them since they were puppies, and they were glad to see him and were ready for a frolic; but when their friend didn't get up they at once knew something was wrong. First they howled long and mournfully; then they dashed away, ran to their master's house, and awakened him by their barking and scratching. He knew their intelligence, and followed them to where the old man lay insensible. He carried him to the factory office, summoned a surgeon by telephone, and while the doctor reduced the fracture the two dogs stood on the outside of the office with their fore feet on the window sill and watched him through the window. - New York Sun.

Counterfeit Silver Dollars Afloat.

Comparatively new counterfeit silver dollars, dated 1882, are in circulation in Chicago. They are so nearly perfect as almost to defy detection and any one not an expert would take them without question, and even an expert would be deceived unless he made a critical examination. They are nearly up to the standard weight. The milling, on which so many counterfeiters fail, is admirably done. The ring is almost genuine and the general execution good. They are, however, lacking in the rich silver color or appearance, but look like tin in light colored brickdust water. They are supposed to have come here in quantities during the holidays.-Chicago Herald.

Henry George's Legacy.

The widow of George Hutchins, of New Jersey, has recently written to Henry George with reference to the legacy of \$7,000 left by her deceased husband for the purpose of being applied to the gratuitous distribution of Mr. George's book. Mrs. Hutchins explains that her share of her husband's estate was very much less than she had supposed; in fact, that it was totally insufficient for her support. In reply Henry George told her that under the circumstances he would ascertain what legal action must be taken with the view of transferring to her the money left to him. The money was left to him absolutely. - Chicago

Unique Game of Polo.

A game of polo, supplemented with an original and unique feature, was played with great success at Wooster, O., a few evenings ago. Seven contestants on rollers were given charge over as many large, fat turkeys, to be driven through the usual goal. The birds were to be shown the greatest possible kindness, and nothing allowed in propelling them to the goal but a gentle "Shoo' or a slight tension of the tender rope which connected them with the contestants. After twenty minutes' careful coaching one of the fowls suddenly grasped the idea and boldly stalked through, amid storms of applause.

Walk Tip-Toes Through the Mud. Have you ever noticed how careless the men down town are about crossing the muddy streets! I often think with pity of their poor wives or whoever has to brush off the mud. They splash right into the thickest part and not only spatter themselves, but every one in their neighborhood. Now, if they would only go on their tip-toes their heels would have no chance to spatter their trousers or the people behind them. The bell was well toned, of brass, and about two and a half inches across the base. It was hung to the bird by a copper wire twisted around the neck. There was no chafing, the skin being protected by an abundance of down; 1879 was scratched on the narrow, flat top of the bell. - New York Sun.






