



#### A SUICIDE IN NEW YORK.

The Son of August Belmont Shoots Himself- 1 Companion's Story.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31. - Raymond Belmont' aged 21, youngest son of August Belmont killed himself with a pistol. The shooting is reported to the police as accidental.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The World says that Raymond Belmont went out to dinner lsst night and returned shortly before one o'clock. With him was Leonard Behr, nightwatchman, with whom Raymond was well acquainted, and who frequently accompanied him home. Together they went down to the basement, where there was a shooting gallery in which young Belmont, who was an expert shot, frequently practic ed. As they entered the room young Bel mont picked up a double acting revolver of 32 calibre, and, turning to Behr, said "Now, I want you to go and hold up a gold collar button in your hand and I will shoot it off." Behr, who had great confidence in him, at once agreed to do this. Before taking up his position, however, young Belmont turned and said : "First close all the doors so that the report may not alarm father, who is up stairs." Thereupon Behr walked over to the door and just put his hand upon it when he heard the report of the pistol. Turning at once he saw young Belmont falling to the floor, blood gushing from a wound in the right side of his head. "My God, Raymond, the cried, "what have you done?" Behr leaned over the young man, who opened his eyes, and, looking at him, tried to speak but could not. As Behr looked at him he closed his eyes and became unconscious. Behr then aroused August Belmont. Physicians were immediately summoned, but they failed to resuscitate the young man. The bullet entered the brain and he died in a few minutes. The coroner said all the indications pointed to suicide. Mrs. Belmont is in Washington with her son, Perry Belmont.
