KINGSTON LIBERALITY.

A Comparison That is not in Good Taste Credit to the City.

On Sunday the Rev. Mr. Pollard, of Ottawa, made a comparison before a Kingston congregation of the contributions given by Ottawa and by Kingston churchmen for mission purposes. He laid great stress upon Ottawa having last year given more than Kingston by fifty dollars. Did he have the fair play to acknowledge that this is not by any means a regular happening; that Kingston's past record is far ahead, whether upon mission gifts or general contributions to the diocese? And when speaking of Kingston's churches being endowed while Ottawa's were not, did he make it plain that though St. George's is heavily endowed the rector benefits much more than the congregation; that the endowments of St. Paul's and St. James' are mere trifles, while All Saints' is not aided in any way? Further he might have acknowledged that Ottawa is a city of twice Kingston's size, and corresponding greater for individual wealth, and a much greater preportion of high salaried pewholders through being the seat of government. For Kingston to do on the average as well as Ottawa is vastly to its credit.

LIBERALS TAKE HOLD.

THEY ARE BOUND TO WIN IN THE APPROACHING ELECTION.

It is Not, Apparently, Whether They Will Win, but What Majority Mr. Blake will Have in the New House-The Quebec Legislature is Adjourned-The Ministerial Elections.

QUEBEC, Feb. 2.—Both houses of the legislature adjourned this afternoon to March 16th. The legislative council met at three, when Hon. Mr. Garneau was introduced and took his seat. The lieutenant-governor came down at 3:15, without any fuss or feathers, and the assembly being summoned his honor informed them that owing to the acceptance of office from the crown by certain members of that house, it was his pleasure that an opportunity be given to issue writs for supplying the vacancies. His honor then took his departure, and the two houses proceeded to business.

In the assembly the Hon. Mr. Turcotte gave the ministerial explanations in French and Mr. Murphy in English. Mr. Turcotte moved that the house adjourn till March 16th. Mr. Lynch seconded the motion, and it passed without opposition. Mr. Turcotte's also for the issue of the writs for the ministerial elections and declaring that the 16th of March shall be considered as the first day of the session for private bills. Nearly all the non-resident members left

for home, and Hon. Messrs. Mercier, Mc-Shane and Duhamel for Montreal to open the campaign in their constituencies.

The ministers have decided to devote all their available time between this and their elections to the business of their departments, and no appointments will be consi dered or made until then.

In the council Hon Mr. Garneau gave the ministerial explanations, and moved the adjournment.

A SPECIMEN COMPLAINT.

The Facts Brought Forth by an Investigation-No Ground for Grumbling.

Alfred Palmatier, of Sheffield township, Addington, came out of the general hospital here on Tuesday last, after a week's treatment, and made complaint to a WHIG reporter. His sickness, he said, was brought on by hard work, and he went to the hospital expecting good attendance and substantial food, but that the food he received was unwholesome and "not fit for a dog," so much so that he had not had a satisfactory meal; that the medicine had done him harm, and he was made crazy at times ; that he could not see, was frequently kept from steeping, and that whizzing noises began in his head. Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick, visiting governor for the month, when spoken to, said the food complaint was not reasonable. as he had a week before made a special investigation on this subject, and had gone the rounds of the hospital and received no complaint save one, from a patient, that the

butter was not first-class, as very little butter is at this season. Then, as to the medicine, Palmatier's complaint was absurd, as treat the patients, and the drugs are procured fresh and frequently at a leading city drug store. However he undertook to specially enquire into this case. This he did to-day, visiting unexpectedly at the meal hour and finding all the food wholesome and good. He asked for complaints on this subject and none were forthcoming. From the house surgeon it was learned that Palmatier's illness was not from overwork. He was chiefly treated for syphilitic sore throat, for which he was given a gargle of hot chloride of potash in a mixture, with pot. iodide 11 drams with an infusion of quassia, three times a day after meals. Nothing in these could create any mental excitement. For a slight fever he was given four grains o' quinine, but refused a second dose. The nurse of the ward reports that he complained of food, but scarcely anything would taste well to a person having such a bad throat affection; he was not mentally excited further than by a fear that he was going to die and his body would be given to students, an unfounded alarm in both cases, and more especially as bodies are always guarded for relatives or friends; the hospital steward dare not make any other disposition of a body liable to be claimed. Palmatier finally left the hospital while still in a weak state, declining to remain

DESPERATE TRAIN FIGHT.

Prisoner Who is Rescued-The Mad Work of Five of His Accomplices.

PITTSBURG, Feb. 4.—Capt. Hoehen and Detective Hulligan, of Cleveland, having received a requisition, determined to return to Cleveland last night on the C. &. P. road with their prisoner, Harry McMunn, accused of having been concerned in the recent fur robbery in that city. They securely hand-cuffed the prisoner and placed him on board the train at Alleghany. At Alliance, Ohio, five men boarded the train and passed into the smoking car. The five men arose suddenly and drew revolvers on the officers. One of the men demanded the prisoner. The officers jumped and tried to draw their revolvers, but too late. The five men opened fire on them. Capt. Hoehen reeled over into the aisle with bullets in his shoulder and thigh. One of the gang jumped on him and kicked him until he lay as still as death. When the firing first commenced Detective Hulligan received several bullets in the body. He attempted to defend himself, and another volley was fired at him until seven bullets had pierced him. He fell insensible and was then kicked until his head split open. The few passengers in the smoking car became terrorized and hid under the seats. The alarm spread to other cars, and the trainmen and other passengers hurried forward. The prisoner and rescuers had disappeared in the excitement, having jumped from the train.
