On three occasions has ex-Governor Bate contested for the privilege of representing Tennessee in the United States senate, and success has crowned his pertinacity at last.



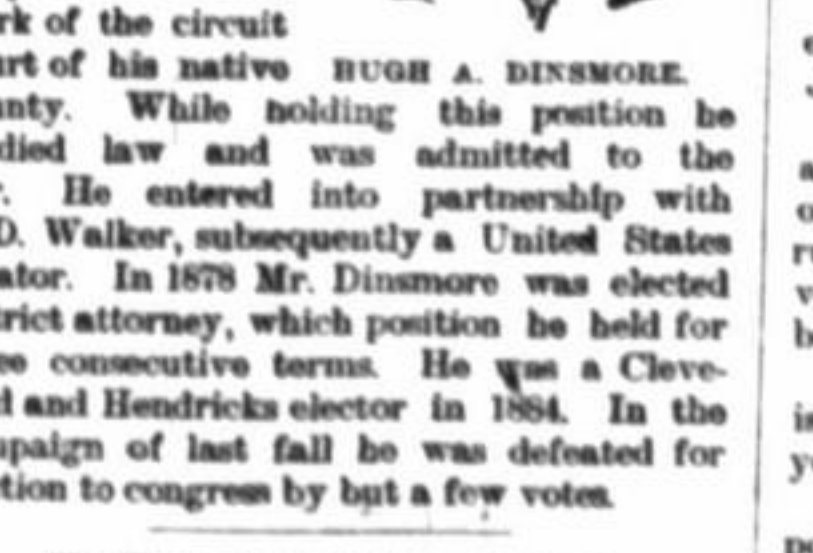
