



GEORGE WESTINGHOUSE, JR.

How He Has Been Rewarded for His Ingenuity.

The Westinghouse air brake has carried the name of its inventor to every land in which is found the iron rail, eyen the cars of the single railroad in Japan use this brake. Mr. Westinghouse has given his attention to other mechanical appliances until a list of his inventions covered by patents now number 1,000. The subject to which he has given his latest attention is the utilization of natural gas, and in this he has so well succeeded that gas is about the only fuel burned in Pittsburg.

It is only fifteen years since Mr. Westinghouse began the manufacture of his own inventions; to-day his factories are located on two continents, giving employment to between 3,000 and 4,000 men. About 1873 the Westinghouse air brake works were erected at Pittsburg. Two years later branch works were established in England, and since then works have been built at Paris and in Ger-

After the brake manufactories were organized so the whole, railway world could be supplied with his invention, Mr. Westinghouse turned his attention to other fields. The Union Switch and Signal company next came



into existence, followed by the Westinghouse Machine company, later the Philadelphia Natural Gas company and about a yearago the Westinghouse Electric Light company. In all of these enter prises Mr. Westingshouse is the controlling spirit. The number of mer

GEORGE WESTINGHOUSE, employed in the different works is about as follows: The air brake company employs about 1,500, the Union Switch company 350 men, the machine company 150 and the electric company 300. The number employed by the natural gas company varies from about 400 in winter to 2,000 in summer or the pipe laying season.

Many people have an idea that Mr. Westinghouse struggled from poverty to his present millions. This was not the case. He is the son of a Schenectady, N. Y., manufacturer of agricultural implements. H graduated from Cornell in 1861. He enlisted in the civil war first as engineer on the war ship Must wetah and afterward as a member of a New York cavalry regiment. His experience in repairing railroad wrecks after Confederate railers suggested to him a device for replacing derailed cars. This was the beginning of his career as an inventor. He settled in Pittsburg and has since lived there.

Mr. Westinghouse's home is situated just outside the Pittsburg city limits. It is misnamed "solitude," for Mrs. Westinghouse is a most charming hostess and their residence is the scene of many and brilliant so ial gatherings. Receptions are held every Friday and the Westinghous dinner parties are said to be elegance itself. Mrs. Westinghouse was a Miss Walker of New York. She las but one child, a boy of 3 years.

'KING SOLOMON'S MINES."

Serial of Very Great Interest Let Every Lady and Gentleman Read it.

We begin to-day the publication of a new story of thrilling interest, entitled "King Solomon's Mines," by J. Rider Haggard, a writer who has lately achieved a reputation second to no novelist of modern days The story is fully illustrated. He is also the author of the novel "She," which is one of the most interesting of the day.

The scene of this tale is laid in that mystic land of which so little is known Kukuanaland, a region to the north of Cape Town in Africa. Sir Henry Curtis, an English man, in search of a brother with whom he had quarrelled, and who had left his home, reached Cape Town, accompanied by Capt. Good, a quaint character. At Cape Town they accidentally meet one Allen Quartermain, an elephant hunter, who had two years previously, met Sir Henry's brother up country, on the point of starting for a region hitherto unexplored by white men in search of Solomon's Mines. Sir Henry insisted that Quartermain must accompany them. He consented, first explaining the hazardous nature of the attempt, and re vealing what he knew of the legend of King Solomon's Mines.

The story was that years previous he had met a Portugee, named Jose Sylvestra, who with a servant, started to cross the desert to the mines. In a week he returned a wreck. dying of thirst, but entrusted to Quarter main a document, containing the secret of Solomon's Mines, accompanied by a map to show how to reach them.

The legend further ran that far in the interior there was a ruined city, the Ophir of the bible, and near by were the famous mines where King Solomon obtained his wonderful diamonds and precious stones.

Sir Henry Curtis resolved to start for the mines without delay. Among the servants engaged was a Zulu named Umbopa, who proved to be of incalculable value. After unparalleled hardship and suffering and loss of lives, they found themselves in Kukuanaland among a warlike people, whose armies were in a state of perfect discipline, govern-

One of the customs of this curious people was the annual witch hunt, and the sacrifice of the fairest girl was an annual event. The girl Foulata, selected on this occasion, appealed to Sir Henry, who protected her. Umbopa, the Zulu servant, the rightful king of the Kukuanas, his father having been murdered by Twala, and his mother expelled from the country, through the conni vance of disaffected chiefs, assisted by Sir Henry, Good and Quartermain, after a battle in which thousands were killed, defeated Twala, who was killed by Sir Henry, and assumed the reins of power. With Umbopa's assistance they succeeded in finding the chambers in which the chests of diamonds were stored. The return to Cape Town, and the finding of Sir Henry's brother followed. The story is well-written, the scenes graphically delineated, and the interest of the reader enchained from the first chapter to the last.
