WHAT SHALL WE WEAR?

STYLISH COATS AND SUITS FOR LITTLE GIRLS.

How Ladies of Fashion are Dressing Their Hair—Revival of the Opal—Some of the New Features of French Walking Dresses.

This graceful design from Harpers Bazar, represents some of the new features of French walking dresses. It is made of Suede colored ladies' cloth combined with plaid brown and Suede velvet. The velvet serves for the

round skirt, and for the Louis Quatorze coat, which is made on and forms part of a polonaise of the Suede cloth. Plain brown velvet is used for the revers, cuffs and collar, and also for trimming the round hat of Suede felt. The crown of the hat is covered with a panache composed of ostrich tips and wings shaded from Suede to dark brown.

Little Girls in and Out of Doors.

This week are presented two attractive models for little girls—the one suited to indoor wear, the other a pretty coat for the street.

The house suit is of English striped cheviot, trimmed with velvet. The waist has a full front of surah with revers of velvet on either side, and a strap of velvet across the bottom that fastens with a metal ornament. The back of the waist is finished in jacket style with broad laps of velvet on either side and the skirt is laid in broad, box plaits. This style is worn by girls from 4 to 10 years of age.

Rough English cloth is used for the Gretchen coat. The double breasted body is finished with a rolling collar and a hood lined with bright surah silk, around the waist is a broad belt of the goods fastening with a clasp. There are deep pocket laps and the skirt is box plaited. These coats are very serviceable in seal brown or golden brown colored cloth, and are suited to the same ages as is the cheviot suit.

Styles in Hairdressing.

While the majority of ladies wear the hair dressed high on the head, there is no set rule as to how it shall be arranged; and the more irregular the disposition of it and unstudied the effect, the better. Small combs are in high vogue and are placed according to the fancy of the wearer, but where they will apparently do the most good. Sometimes the hair is parted down the middle of the back, and each strand is twisted separately and disposed high on the head, making a sort of double French twist effect; or one strand is carried over the other, and a comb with a square top ornaments the place of crossing. The front is dressed in loose waves and short, fluffy curls, shading the forehead only slightly. For dressy wear, bows and pompons and feathers and aigrettes are placed well forward and a little to one side. Very beautiful ornaments in these styles for the hair can be found ready made; clusters of short tips, cream or pink, or pale blue, curling over like the leaves of a lily, with brilliant aigrettes standing in the center; rosettes of narrow, picot edged ribbon, in dark as well as light colors, with the inevitable aigrette in the middle, sometimes of silver or gold; pompons made of picot ribbon, with upright loops of wider ribbon used as an aigrette; a cluster of roses surrounded with foliage of jetted leaves; and in some flowers, tips and ribbons are combined.—Demorest's Monthly.

Revival of the Opal.

Numbered with important revivals is that of the opal. The restoration of this beautiful gem to fashion is due in part to Queen Victoria's penchant for this so called unlucky stone and American women's fondness for everything that is stylish. Another reason for the introduction of the opal is the fact that the fire and peculiar shadings of a fine gem cannot be reproduced in inferior materials, and in these days of cunning imitation this is a powerful incentive among fashionable folk. Fine Hungarian and South American opals have been imported in unprecedented numbers, and what is more to the purpose, ladies are taking to them very kindly, not only in rings but in brooches and other ornaments.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE.

Facts, Theories and Advice From Well Known Authorities on Health.

Notwithstanding the thorough investigations during late years of the physiology of digestion, authorities continue to differ on some important points. One tells us that the habit of chewing gum is very prejudicial because it excites salivary glands so unnaturally that when called upon afterward to act in the mastication of food they cannot respond as fully as they should. Again we are informed that perfect rest of all the organs is essential to refreshing sleep, and that if food is taken just before retiring, and we go to sleep with a stomach more or less full, the sleep will be unsatisfactory and disturbed. On the other hand, authorities of Amherst college, in instructions to students, recommend half an hour of sleep after dinner and supper, and the eating of a few Graham crackers just before retiring, when wakful from brainwork, to draw the excess of blood from the brain to the stomach. They also state that chewing gum daily before eating, aids the digestion of food by increasing the flow of saliva and stimulates indirectly the secretion of the digestive juices of the stomach. Science, in commenting on these differing views, agrees that food is useful in cases of sleeplessness, and believes that many a person has been kept awake from a mistaken whim that he must not eat at night. It is of opinion that a few Graham crackers can never do harm; but is doubtful as to the benefits of chewing gum upon the digestion, and would hesitate to recommend it without a guaranty of the composition of the gum used.

Improving the Complexion.

If women would only take better care of their feet there would be fewer complaints of both muddy complexions and eruptions of the skin. Next in importance, if not equal to it, after a healthful diet, comes care of the feet. Not one woman in ten has absolutely warm, dry feet from October to May. The feet ought always to be warm, in spite of weather, which means warm stockings frequently changed and stout, thick boots in cold weather. In addition to warmly clothing the feet try every night, just before retiring, dipping the soles of the feet in cold water an instant, quickly rubbing dry with a towel and afterward heating for a few minutes before the fire. By observing the above suggestions the circulation in your lower extremities will be good, all fullness of the head and palpitations of the heart will be relieved, the complexion improved and health made better in many respects.

Gaslight in the Nursery.

Gas and paraffine lamps should not be used in the nursery. Such is the opinion of a prominent physician, who adds that in almost every room where gas is burned a plant will droop and die. Children are like plants; they require, above all things, pure air, light and sunshine—not gaslight, but daylight, sunlight and as much of it as possible. In the nursery there should be no heavy hangings to obscure the light and hold dust, and no gas pipes. Gas injures in many ways. Its light is too strong for a babe's eyes; it absorbs all the pure air in the room before the child can get a chance to inflate its little lungs with oxygen; its heat is enervating, and there is always the danger of leakages. These leakages may be so small as to be imperceptible, but large enough to be injurious to the health.
