TELLS ALL ABOUT BEAUTIFUL LOS ANGELES.

The Ladies Fair of That Far Away Place—The High Price of Land—How to Live There—How to Visit the Place. Some Other Matters.

[Special Correspondence.] SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 1. IN THE PALM LAND.

My palm land has ladies, with eyes held down—Held down, because if they lifted them, Why, you would be lost in this Spanish town.

My palm land has ladies so fair, so fair, That they bend their eyes to the holy book Lest you forget yourself, your prayer.

And these are the ladies that no men see, And this is the reason men see them not. Better their modest, sweet mystery— Better by far than the battle shot.

And so, in this curious old town of files, The Mexican quarter or day's long gone, In castles of rock and tumbledown piles These women still live on and on.

And yet, possibly, I do not think you would like Los Angeles at first sight. It is a scattered, camp like town. True, there are some few sections of that southern capital of the far Pacific that look stately enough, and make you think of the cottages at Newport or Long Branch for a moment as they appear in their gay midsummer attire and equipments; but there are other parts of the town that make you think of the mud huts of Ireland.

But, altogether, the bustling city is not nearly so beautiful as its name or its delicious orange environs.

Los Angeles is built all around and about on the uneven little hills that loaf about on either side of the most lawless and irresponsible little stream of sand and water in the world. And this stream of sand and water rises up about twice each year and swallows up a good many houses and several people.

A year ago when I was there and saw how land was looming up in price, I said, "Nonsense! there will be a tumble." But land of all kinds in and about Los Angeles has almost doubled in price since I said that and it is still climbing right ahead! In fact, I suppose that Los Angeles is to-day the most prosperous spot on the face of this whole earth.

It is too high for me to advise any man who is not already rich to go there for the purpose of making money or securing a home for wife and little ones. Stop on the way and make a little paradise somewhere in Arizona, where it was not wise so much to begin with. But if you only want to see the world, why go right along and live and grow fat on the sweet and salubrious air of the palm land, where you pluck blossom and orange from the same bough the season through.

Yet the sun does not always shine there. I have seen sand storms both there and in San Diego that would drive a stranger almost insane. They are not very frequent, nor are they at all dangerous. They certainly are not half as hard to put up with as snow storms. But it is only fair that a truthful chronicler should recognize their peculiar existence.

The first one of these sand storms I ever encountered was in Arizona, and nearly thirty years ago. I remember it as the most terrible storm I ever saw. I was with a party of Mexicans engaged in driving mules to the north. The storm came very suddenly and we were blind almost instantaneously. Some of the men fell from their horses and lay flat on the face of the sand, as you read of in the story that sweeps over the Sahara desert. We had some soldiers with us, and they lay down on the drifting sand. About an hour the sand storm turned into a rain storm, a regular cyclone and cloud burst in fact. I never really saw lightning before or since. The stacked muskets were struck by lightning and some of the gun barrels were melted. Then the sun came out and all was as suddenly still and smooth and beautiful as the storm had been sudden and terrible.

Living in Los Angeles is of the cheapest and the best in the world. This is but natural, since California sends her meat and wine and fruits to all parts of the earth. A loaf of bread or a beefsteak is certainly cheaper where it is grown than it can possibly be after it is shipped all the way to Chicago, New York or Liverpool. The same principle of political economy applies more especially to all the finer supplies for the table.
