demand such a thing. He believed all that was necessary could have been accomplished by placing Riel under lock and key for the rest of his life. He said that Hon. Edward Blake had, in this case, taken account of the fact that the man had been three times in the lunatic asylum, and there was a strong probability of the return of his insanity, and that in the reign of Her Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria no man had been hanged for treason. Anent Riel's trial he regretted it had not been before twelve jurymen and a chief justice; and the recommendation to mercy made by the jury showed that Riel was not a convicted felou, since Mr. Blake had offered a reward to bring a supposed criminal before the bar of justice, but the leader of the federal government, with one hand raised aloft, wished to God he could catch him, while the other he plunged into the treasury for money to induce the man to leave the country. (Tremendous cheering.) Riel was exiled for five years, and paid the penalty for his first offence. They had no right to punish him a second time for that act. But the blackest part of the affair was what Mr. Boswell had recently made public, that the conservative leaders had threatened to turn Sir John Macdonald from power if the man's life was not taken, and he was hanged "If," he said, "you want a deeper pit of baseness in which to sink any public man I have yet to read the pages of history which describes it. (Great cheering.) It was a solemn moment when the question of hanging Riel became ONE OF POLITICAL EXPEDIENCY;

then it become awfully repulsive. It was an awful moment when the life's blood of a being, were he the basest wretch upon earth, was to be taken in order that a party might into power again. (Cheers.) The picture drawn by Mr. Blake was so vivid that for ten minutes there was a deep silence, and when the final thrust was made the audience, with our voice, declared its appreciation of the speech. And the peroration, with every indication of victory for the liberals, was thrilling. Men screamed as Mr. Blake told of the victory that was coming. He appealed to their consciences to have the truth spread throughout the land. He urged the electors to gird themselves for the fight, and to not only use their franchise well, but their influence also, in seeing that bribery did not enter the city, that men would not prove false to themselves, their country and their God by handling filth, or that which would bring the blush of shame to their faces or make them feel that they had sold their country. 'Resent it! Resent it! Resent it!" he cried with rising inflections, and the audience cheered him louder and louder. Mr. Blake told of the old bible battles, pictured the scenes presaging victory and the advances made in the capture of strong places, and then, in delightful language, told how the liberals should act in the present crisis. In the bat tle of right against wrong, of truth against falsehood, they knew who must win. (Cheers.) "Let us bestir ourselves," he said, "now that the presaging sounds of victory are advancing; let us wipe out evil, jobbery, dishonesty, trickery, and gross selfishness, and put righteousness, truth, and unselfishuess in their place, and thus declare the pride we feel that we live in a day when we cast the evil out and placed the good in its stead." (Cheers.)

He sat down at 11 o'clock amid wild enthusiasm. Capt. Crawford, in a felicitious way, moved and Joseph Wilson, seconded a vote of thanks to the speaker, and the audience endorsed it with rousing cheers.

The meeting was one of the grandest ever held in the city and had done much to inspire the electors for the battle of Tuesday next.

THE SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

The Mail in Favor of it-A Kindly Word for the City of Kingston.

Toronto Mail. It is very essential that a school of science should exist in every important section of the province, especially where there is a variety of industrial interests. The latter eastern Ontario has in a marked degree. It is a vast undeveloped mineral region ; Kingston is one of the largest, if not the largest, shipping ports in the province; the Bay of Quinte districts is one of the richest agricultural and horticultural sec tions of the country; from Leeds to Glen garry the dairy interests is very large and steadily increasing; Trenton, Belleville and Deseronto are centres of the lumber and wooden ware manufacturing interests; and Kingston has large machine shops and manufactories. All these sections of eastern Ontario are agreed that Kingston is the proper place for a school of practical science, and the need of such an institution was well illustrated the other day by the reeve of Deseronto, who stated that the skilled labour necessary for the chemical and steel shipbuilding works about to start in that place would have to be imported from Great Britain and the United States. The necessity for practical scientific education being apparent, it is equally clear that the young men who wish to acquire it cannot be expected to go a long distance from Lome for the purpose or to take a regular university course. There need would be satisfied by short courses of instruction in the winter months, with evening classes for skilled mechanics. Such instructions would arouse a desire for further intellectual training, and the results could not but be benefical to the

community at large These are very briefly the arguments ad vanced by the advocates of Kingston scheme, and we know of no reasonable objection to them. The cost to the country would be trifling, and it is claimed that it is folly for the government to think of spending large amounts on some of the "fancy" subjects suggested in the confederation scheme, when far greater results can be accomplished by a comparatively insignificant expenditure. Harvard possesses a professor of Chinese, who has an average of one-third of a student annually, that is to say, one in three years but Harvard has an income of about \$750, 000 a year, and can afford such costly luxur In Ontario we may well leave the es tablishment of such chairs to private liberal ity and devote the public funds to purposes from which the people at large will benefit.

THE PEOPLE ARE STARVING.

A Dreadful State of Things in Newfound land-Help Wanted.

St. Johns, Nfld., Feb. 14.—The commer cial houses on this island are on the verge of a financial crisis. News from the northern parts of the island represent things in a deplorable condition. The government has already sent thousands of barrels of flour to keep the people from starving, but the supply is altogether inadequate. The most northerly parts are now frozen, and it is impossible to send supplies there in time to save the people. It was a most pitiful sight to witness the scenes at many places at which the coasting steamer Curlew stopped on her last trip north. Scores of people, who had had nothing but codfish and hardtack (and but very little of that) to subsist on for months, dragged themselves across twenty to fifty miles of barren rocks and wild wastes to where the steamer stopped. They came in hopes of getting supplies of flour, molasses and pork enough to keep body and soul together during the next three months, but the steamer had no supplies for them, and, discouraged, they started to return to their miserable homes to suffer all the pangs of hunger and exhaustion, added to the rigors of a Newfoundland winter. Meanwhile the government has spent such large sums in purchasing supplies and in constructing the Placentia railway to furnish labor and to save the people of this district from starvation, that the treasury is depleted. Newfoundland fish are a glut on every market, owing to inability to compete with bounty fed Frenchmen. The is land presents to the world the most mournful spectacle, and its people are the most miserable of all English colonists.

A VERY PECULIAR SECT.

They are Believers in Prophecy-The Expected Fulfillment of it.

ECONOMY, Penn., Feb. 16.—The Economites or Harmonists celebrated the eighty second anniversary of the formation of that society. The day was devoted to feasting, praising God, rejoicing and making merry. For nearly a century the Economists have been daily expecting the second coming of thrist, as it is believed the glorious advent will take place before the death of the last surviving member of the society. The elder Henrici said he believed the time for which they had waited so long was close at hand. The prophecies concerning the last days, prior to the coming of Christ and the destruction of the world, had been fulfilled, and he thought the present troubles in Europe, United States and Canada, would shortly involve the 200,000,000 people spok en of by St. John in bitter strife. He reiter ated the firm belief of the Harmonists that Christ will establish a kingdom upon Mount Sinai, and hinted at the removal of the entire society to Palestine as soon as there was an indication of the fulfillment of the last of the prophecies, that they might be ready to greet their Master at his coming and place all their possessions at his disposal. The Economite society numbered nearly 1,000 members at one time, but not more than 500 survive. Their property is valued at from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000.
