# REVIEW OF THE FIELD.

THE LIBERALS HAD A MOST HOPE-FUL OUTLOOK.

Nomination Day, the Country Over, Displayed the Popularity of Their Cause-The Whole Dominion is Aroused-Conservatives Rushing to the Reform Side.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—The official nominations in Ottawa city, when McIntyre and St. Jean, liberals, and Perley and Robillard, tories, were nominated, resulted in a riot, which did not subside till the interior of. the council chamber of the city hall was wrecked. The liberals were in a decisive majority, but the tory leaders, backed by bullies, tried to force on the meeting Dr. Grant, a tory. The liberals had previously moved that county Attorney Lees be chairman. Dr. Grant, at the instance of his. friends, took the chair. The liberals protested, and insisted that the choice of chairman be left to the meeting. Dr. Grant stuck to his post, and the tories howled so that. the motion by the liberals could not be put. Then the crowd surged forward and the platform was stormed by the rival political parties. Liberals and tories by turns captured the point of advantage until chairs and furniture were wrecked, blows were struck and a general fight indulged in. Men were knocked down and trampled upon, noses were smashed, eyes blackened and coats actually torn off their wearers' backs and ripped into rags. Police came on the ground but they were powerless. The two tory candidates mounted the reporters' table and danced a jig. In the meantime thieves were at work and pocket picking was frequent. Pictures of Mr. Blake were displayed by the liberals and greeted with tremendous cheers. Returns, announcing opposition elections by acclamation, were conspicuously displayed, to be greeted in the same manner with counter demonstrations. Shortly after 4 o'clock the speakers made a start for the open air balcony, and from thence addressed thousands of electors in the square below. This stopped the rioting. The liberal candidates received an ovation at the hands of the electors. The liberals are confident of carrying both seats by enormous major-
