

THE SHAKE-UP IN ITALY.

THE LOSS OF LIFE GREATER THAN WAS FIRST STATED.

Whole Villages are Ruined and Destroyed -Many Buried by Houses and Churches Falling on Them-Camping Out in

the Cold, and Suffering Intensely. Paris, Feb. 24.—A renewal of the earth. quake shocks occurred in the southern section of France. A terrible dispater is momentarily expected. Nice, Cannes and Mentone are half deserted. Fears are expressed for the safety of Prince of Wales and the Orleans princes, all of whom are in

the country affected. ROME, Feb. 25.—The earthquake was strongly felt out on the Sea of Genoa. It awoke the sailors from their sleep. At Turin a portion of the ceiling of Santa Teresa church fell upon the worshippers, but none were killed. In many of the streets traffic was stopped. Houses were rendered liable to fall. At Castellaro the church collapsed, killing many persons. Soldiers have been sent to the villages, visited by earthquake, to assist in burying the dead. King Humbert desired to proceed to Genoa, but was dissuaded therefrom. The Italian Sooth sayer, an almanac, predicted earthquake shocks between the 15th and 23rd of Febru-

NICE, Feb. 25.—The excitement caused

by the earthquake is subsiding. GENOA, Feb. 25. -Oscillations of the earth, from north to south, were felt throughout Switzerland. No loss of life is reported, but much damage has been done to the pro-

perty. NICE, Feb. 25.—At Mentone 250 houses were rendered uninhabitable. Several fires occurred, but they were speedily extinguish. ed. Military guards are on duty to prevent the pillaging of the wrecked houses. The field telegraph is now working in many places. A bread famine is expected owing

to the destruction of the ovens of the bakers. ROME, Feb. 25.—It is reported that at Bussana, a village of 800 inhabitants, successive shocks have levelled nearly every house. One third of the people are said to be buried in the ruins, and there is no hope of rescuing them. Not one of 106 communes, in the populous province of Porto Maurizio, escaped injury. The villages built on terraces, on the sides of a hill, are almost all destroyed. The distress is great everywhere, and the nights are very cold.

NICE, Feb. 25. - Some wells in this section have dried up as a result of the earthquake. Others have increased in volumes. A jet of hot water burst from a bed of the Pailton river. Miss Chapeles, American, was buried in the ruins of Villa Natal, but was rescued unhurt. The total number of the injured is 23. There were occasional tremors yester
