Various Estimates of the Strength of the Government Supporters-Close Votes Which May Not Stand a Scrutiny-Af-

fairs in the East. QUEBEC, Feb. 25.—The result of the Chi- BOWES & BISONETTE, coutimi election is still doubtful. While the press despatches claim Mr. Gagne, conservative, returned by 140 with several places to hear from, private telegrams confirm Mr. Couture's election and Le Canadien admits it by 154. Sir A. Caron's real majority in Quebec county is 154.

The return of Mr. Colombe, for Maskinonge, is questioned. Mr. Valin is demanding a recount in Montmorency. Mr. Langelier, the member elected for that county, claims that his majority is not one but four.

Le Canadien states that Mr. Mercier has dismissed Mr. Desaulniers, the member-elect for St. Maurice, from the position of assistant clerk of the legislative council here, to which he was appointed by the late Ross government, but that, nevertheless, Mr. Desaulniers will retain the office, as he holds it not from the government but from the legislative council.

Upon information sworn out by Mr. M. Hearn, the unsuccessful candidate for street, Nolan and Hanlon, were arrested on 32. a charge of having acted as bribery agents to secure Mr. McGreevy's election. Another important arrest for the same offence will be

Mr. Pelletier, the defeated opposition candidate, and Premier Mercier have gone to Three Rivers. All the reports coming from there agree that never was there such a saturnalia of corruption and debauchery as that by which Sir Hector managed to save himself from defeat by a majority of ten votes. As much as \$50 and \$100 were paid for individual votes. One thousand five hundred dollars were offered to one of Pelletier's partisars to betray him. A public bar was kept open day and night, at which liquor was supplied, free of charge, to the electors.

The fight between the conservatives and liberals over the results of the voting on Tuesday last is one a Contrance, and neither side is giving or taking quarter. Yesterday it was announced that the conservatives had captured Haldimand. This was a mistake, as the liberal candidate, Mr. Coulter, has been declared elected by a majority of five votes. A recount has been asked for on behalf of his opponent, Dr. Montague. There are a good many small majorities on both sides, and there will be many recounts. The closest

THE RIVIERA EARTHQUAKES.

Some Description of Some of the Places Affected.

Later reports of the recent earthquake in Europe show that it was one of the most disastrous in the annals of history. The accompanying map shows most of the territory over which the undulations extended.

Geneva seems to have been the most northerly point and Rome the most southerly, with the Gulf of Genoa as the center of disturbance. Of course the full extent of the disaster is not yet known, and we must wait for the European mails for details.



MAP SHOWING EXTENT OF EARTHQUAKE. Italy has from time immemorial been the home of the earthquake, but most of the earth's tremblings in that part of the world have been further south. In 1855 occurred what was known as the earthquake of Viego. It was felt slightly in Paris, Mentz and Geneva. Its greatest violence was between Berne, Logano and Chamouni.
