In an article a column long the Kingston News expresses the grief which the action of the local liberals has brought upon it.

It would be folly, and worst than folly, to treat the lugubrious wail of our contemporary seriously. The election is believed to have been corruptly conducted by our opponents.

The liberals are said to be "fishing for evidence." Indeed? And suppose they are. The conservatives are similarly engaged.

"The case that has arisen in Chateaugay emphasizes the necessity of an amendment in the election law in the direction we pointed out the other day--to prevent the disfranchisement of a constituency through the errors of the deputy returning officers.

Mr. Holton does not despair of getting his rights ultimately, but it is possible to put him to great expense and annoyance in the meantime. The government dare not countenance, by any action it may suggest to parliament, the foisting of a rejected candidate upon the electors, and Chateaugay is so liberal as to give no hope of its redemption by the opposite party in a new election, or a series of them.

Advices from the west this morning indicate that Mr. Burke may be elected for Algoma, that Dawson now has a majority of but 58, and that four places are to be heard from, all strongholds of the liberal candidate.

THE KNIGHTS OF LABOR

The Object of Them Approved by the Church. The Pope's Attitude.

Cardinal Gibbon's report to the Holy See on the knights of labor is certainly a favorable one. The nature of it is set forth in the following summing up:

1. Because such a condemnation does not appear to be justified either by the letter or by the spirit of its constitution, of its laws or by the declarations of its heads.

2. That such a condemnation does not appear necessary in view of the transient form of the organization and of the social condition of the United States.

3. That it would not be prudent on account of the reality of the wrongs of the working-men, and the fact that the existence of such is admitted by the American public.

4. That it would be dangerous to the reputation of the church in our democratic country.

5. That it would be powerless to compel the obedience of our Catholic workmen, who would regard it as false and iniquitous.

6. That it would be destructive instead of beneficial in its effects, forcing the sons of the church to rebel against their mother and to range themselves with condemned societies, which they have hitherto avoided.

7. That it would be ruinous to the financial support of the church at home and to the raising of Peter's pence.
